Dear Friends,

There used to be a time when summer at a synagogue was truly a quieter time. There are no Religious School classes to prepare for, no Confirmation classes to teach. Most B'nai Mitzvah students are away at camp, so there are no weekly meetings with our B'nai Mitzvah students and their families. Fewer committees meet regularly, as so many are away on vacation or at the shore. I'm even told that "back then" MLRT did not have its own Shabbat service during the summer- we shared Shabbat services with Beth David, and neither of us had a Shabbat morning service.

Truth be told, summer is a quieter time, but there is still much going on. We hold Shabbat services both Friday night and Saturday morning and our regular *Torah Study* on Saturday morning. *Bible Class* on Thursday, *Forward Thinking* and other classes now meet all year long. And there are other opportunities for learning as well. Starting on June 17, we will collect low-sugar cereal, pasta, peanut butter, low-sugar granola bars, mac-n-cheese, oatmeal, shelf stable plain milk, and applesauce. President's Message: The Path of Judaism

True joy and fulfillment occur only when we share experiences with our family, our friends, and others with whom we have developed relationships. The members of our Confirmation class will be celebrating the fulfillment of their religious education at their Service of Confirmation on Friday, May 31. The following are the remarks I will be giving to the Confirmation class.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees and the entire Main Line Reform Temple congregation, I want to congratulate all of you for this major accomplishment and I want to thank all of your families for their support for you throughout your Religious School education. This Confirmation Service is a major milestone in your lives and we are very proud of you. You made the choice to continue your Jewish education after your B'nai Mitzvah. In the past three years, you examined issues of relationships with friends, family and the world around you through the lens of Jewish values. You

studied issues of Jewish identity and contemporary issues facing the Jewish community. And you participated in the Religious Action Center's L'taken Seminar in Washington, DC, learning about the major social, economic and political issues facing our country and then lobbying Congress to take action. You have had the extraordinary opportunity to read and debate Jewish sources and texts and learn what it really means to live a Jewish life.

Robert Frost, in his poem "The Road Not Taken" said:

Two roads diverged in a yellow wood, And sorry I could not travel both And be one traveler, long I stood And looked down one as far as I could To where it bent in the undergrowth;

Then took the other, as just as fair, And having perhaps the better claim, Because it was grassy and wanted wear; Though as for that the passing there Had worn them really about the same, And both that morning equally lay
In leaves no step had trodden black.
Oh, I kept the first for another day!
Yet knowing how way leads on to way,
I doubted if I should ever come back.

I shall be telling this with a sigh Somewhere ages and ages hence: Two roads diverged in a wood, and I— I took the one less traveled by, And that has made all the difference.

In the beginning, you may not have chosen to go to Religious School. Your parents may have told you that you had to come to MLRT for Religious School classes. You may also not have voluntarily chosen to have your B'nai Mitzvah. But you did choose to continue your Jewish education after your B'nai Mitzvah leading up to this Service of Confirmation. Now, as you complete high school, attend college, and then join the working world, you will have more choices to make.

On one side of the road, a path sits. It is worn down; many have walked on it, and many still do, pressing its leaves into the earth, smoothing the gravel into a fine pulp so that it may be smooth for the next pair of boots that cross it. The other side, however, is not so smooth. It is a bit rocky. It is bright and cheerful, not angry or jealous that the other path has more travelers. At times throughout history, it has been scorched and destroyed, but its grass still grows green. It is the path of Judaism. Being Jewish is not always easy. It has its challenges, as does every religion, brought by the ignorance of others or the lack of fellow travelers. Many of your friends will choose other paths. Some may even ask you to go with them. As you go through life, which path will you choose?

There is something powerful that draws us to the path of Judaism, even though we know that the path is a bit rockier and at times we may even have to use a machete to hack our way through the overgrowth. We know that along the road less traveled, we are more likely to find undiscovered treasures, natural beauty less tarnished by the masses hurtling by on the highways. Many things on the path that we choose, those on other paths will never experience at all. Some flowers only bloom away from the hustle and bustle. The fruit on the trees on our road less traveled is given more time to ripen before it is picked by passersby. On occasion, we may even look down and see the trace of the footprints of those who walked the same path generations before us. At other times, we find ourselves walking the path along side many others, some of whose reasons for being on the path might be very different from our own.

For certain, the road less traveled draws the Jewish soul. In the words of the prophet Micah, "For all the peoples walk, each in the name of their own god, but we will walk in the name of Adonai, our God, forever and ever." I do not know what each of you will encounter along the path you choose, but I hope that you remember that, as Micah tells us, our Jewish values teach us "to do social justice, to love loving-kindness, and to walk humbly with our God." As you continue your journey, there is much more to learn and experience, but I believe that if you continue on this road, it will make all the difference in your lives. I wish the very best to each of you.

Confirmation is a great example of how shared experiences have lasting impact by offering deeper connections to each other, with the community and with Judaism itself. Have a great summer with your family and friends and don't forget to add a little spirituality to your shared experiences!

Born in South Africa, David joined the Armored Reconnaissance, an elite unit in

the Israeli Defense Force (IDF), responsible for surveying the area ahead of the tanks, immediately after high school. He was wounded in the Six Day War before moving to the United States and completing his MBA at Temple University. He returned to Israel to fight in the Yom Kippur War alongside his wife, Bracha, who volunteered as a nurse to treat the sick and wounded.

David will speak about his time in the IDF and the history of Jewish persecution and how that led to the formation of the IDF. This fascinating program will feature a viewing of the film, "We Looked Death in the Eyes" produced by David's unit. It was created in memory of all the soldiers in the unit that were killed during the Six Day War. Soldiers from the unit talk about the war and their friends who were killed and wounded, family members of the killed soldiers talk about their sons, and high ranking officers and members of government talk about the war and the heroic actions of this particular unit. There is actual footage of the fighting as there were camera crews on the reconnaissance vehicles.

Following the movie, David will answer questions from the audience. David and Bracha have been congregants at MLRT since 1975 and he has been tutoring B'nai Mitzvah students at MLRT for 44 years.

Holidays

SHAVUOT

Shavuot is one of our three major pilgrimage festivals, along with Passover and Sukkot. Coming just seven weeks after Passover, Shavuot is often the forgotten festival. Unlike Passover, with Seder, or Sukkot, with the building of the Sukkah or waving of the lulav and etrog, there are few rituals, either synagogue-based or home-centered associated with Shavuot. There isn't even a long tradition of special foods associated with Shavuot, though there is a tradition of eating dairy products. Shavuot commemorates the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai. We link Passover to Shavuot with the counting of each day (called Siphrat Ha'omer), as tradition teaches us the Exodus from Egypt was not just a physical liberation, but also a spiritual liberation, enabling us to be free to follow the ways of Torah and tradition.


