### Beginning Anew

Dear Friends,

L'shana Tova! I wish you and your family and friends a very happy, healthy and good New Year. May it be a year of personal growth, learning and renewal. They say the High Holidays come early or late, but never on time. This year is about as early as the holidays can fall. It does not make for a very restful

August for your Rabbis, Cantor and Temple staff. Yet, whenever they come, the Holidays bring to me a sense of excitement, eager anticipation, and awesome possibilities. It is truly wonderful to be with and see you after the somewhat quieter time of summer. Being with one another in community gives me both hope and renewed strength - qualities surely needed given the realities of the world that confront us each and every day, as well as all that is going in my and our personal lives.

Your clergy team, working closely with our Religious Practices Committee, is planning to introduce a few new "things" for these upcoming Holidays. First and foremost, we have a new member of our team, Cantor Faryn Rudnick. Many of you met Cantor Rudnick over the summer, either at services, at one of our "meet and greet" coffees or dessert receptions, or by just stopping by and saying hello. If you have not yet had the chance to meet Cantor Rudnick personally, please stop by her office the next time you are at the synagogue, or send her an email and make an appointment to just sit and talk, go for a walk, or have a cup of coffee together - whatever works best for you. While most of the music over the High Holidays will follow the traditional "nusach" (melodies) that we have long grown accustomed to and comfortable with, with Cantor Rudnick's leadership, we will be introducing a number of new and exciting melodies as well.

We call ourselves the "Reform" movement. What our movement initially reformed was our liturgy. Over the past 200 years, our movement has led the way to ritual change and innovation, and our movement has published many Shabbat and High Holiday Prayerbooks (or machzorim). Some of us grew up on *UPB 1* or 2. You may remember the *Union Prayer Book* as a smaller dark blue or black covered book, mostly in English, with no Hebrew transliterations. In *UPB 1* (first published in 1892), the rabbi's part was referred to as "minister," and in *UPB 2* (first published in 1940), the rabbi's part was referred to as "reader."

Already in the early 1960's there were calls for more prayerbook reform to address the tremendous changes in the Jewish and general world, including the Holocaust, the establishment of the State of Israel, the atomic bomb and more. *Gates of Prayer*, the *New Union Prayer Book*, edited by Chaim Stern was announced in October 1975 as a replacement for the *UPB*, incorporating more Hebrew content and was updated to be more accessible to modern worshipers. This was followed in 1978 with *Gates of Repentance*. A later version was then published to include gender neutral God language. It is this book that we have been using for our High Holiday worship.

Gates of Repentance is now almost 40 years old, and over these last years, our movement has been working on a new High Holiday and Selichot Prayerbook. In 2015, (after piloting the book for a number of years), our movement published a new Machzor (prayerbook) for the High Holidays entitled Mishkan Hanefesh. Similar in page layout to our Shabbat prayerbook, Mishkah Tefillah (which we have been using for a number of years), this new Machzor uses inclusive "God" language and offers multiple doorways to prayer. There are often many alternatives for English reading, and study and reflection pages in between the major rubrics of the service. With the help of the CCAR, and the guidance of our Religious Practices Committee, we will pilot the new machzor for our congregation for the Erev Rosh Hashanah Service, as well us use the new booklet, Mishkan Halev on Selichot. Your feedback on these new liturgies is important, as it will help guide us in the decision to move to a new prayerbook for all of our High Holiday Services in the future.

Our congregation has never been afraid to innovate and try new modalities of worship. Our *Reset and Renew* virtual tefillah service at Lower Merion High School for the High Holidays and now taking place often during the year in our Sanctuary is an excellent example of our expansion into exciting new modalities of worship. We are proud to call ourselves Reform Jews, and we should celebrate our rich tradition of liturgical change and innovation.

### ■ Building A Better World Together

I hope that you had a great summer with your family and friends! As you read this bulletin, vacations are almost over, our children are going back to school, and we are about to observe the High Holidays.

We are living through some of the most rapid and dramatic changes the world has ever seen. This has divided our country between those who welcome change and those who feel threatened

by it and all its economic, social and cultural repercussions. Change is threatening. It is one of the reasons that species, cultures, even civilizations become extinct. Charles Darwin once said, "It is not the strongest or most intelligent who will survive, but those who can best manage change."

What is it about Judaism that allowed our ancestors to keep going through centuries of uncertainty, never knowing when the next expulsion or persecution would happen, or whether the friends of today would become the enemies of tomorrow. What is it about our faith that gives us the courage to manage change?

As Rabbi Jonathan Sacks said, "First, we never lost our sense of identity, of who we were and why. In all our festivals we remembered our ancestors' journey through the wilderness in search of freedom. Second, we never lost our sense of hope, that God was with us on the way however distant he sometimes seemed. And third, we never forgot the destination, a world of justice, compassion and peace, not yet reached but glimpsed, as it were, from afar. If you remember where you come from, where you are going to, and why, you can handle change because you have a map of values that don't change."

Judaism has contributed to the world some of its most transformative ideas. The eminent Catholic historian Paul Johnson wrote, "To the Jews we owe the idea of equality before the law, both divine and human; of the sanctity of life and the dignity of the human person; of the individual conscience and so of personal redemption; of the collective conscience and so of social responsibility; of peace as an abstract ideal and love as the foundation of justice, and many other items which constitute the basic moral furniture of the human mind."

We currently have a choice before us. If we do nothing, the forces of populism and nationalism, of class and race, will distort our realities until we have little in common. However, it is not too late for us to work together to build a better and more just world. Our goal should not be to erase our differences but to recognize one another and make the effort to walk in each other's shoes. We should not judge one another but learn how to live together.

During the High Holidays, we imagine that the Gates of Heaven are swung open and that we stand before God in judgment. We ask ourselves the hardest questions, "How have I fallen short this past year? Where do I want to be in my life a year from now?" As you prepare to observe the High Holidays, please think about how you can participate in MLRT's social action and social justice initiatives. We can build a better world together!

### Welcome Cantor Rudnick



When I was a freshman in college, I declared to my parents that I wanted to become a cantor. As a child, I had only ever met one cantor - the student cantor who interned at our synagogue the year of my Bat Mitzvah. In eighth grade, however, I began attending the Hebrew High School program at another synagogue, and that is where I had my first introduction to a cantor and to Jewish music, and learned

that music could be used as a tool to communicate with people and with God, to bring people together, and as a vehicle to prayer. As a freshman in high school, studying flute very seriously, the cantor, Hazzan Ilan Mamber, of blessed memory, took me under his wings and began pushing me in the direction of cantorial school. The entry point was through my flute playing, but the lasting impact was in what he taught me about prayer, music, and community.

After college, having studied music education, I began teaching instrumental music in Oakland, NJ, the town where I grew up. For five years, I took full advantage of Cantor Mamber and all he had to teach me. During my fifth and final year of teaching, I applied to cantorial school and in July of 2008, I was headed to Israel for my first year in the Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. The five years I spent in cantorial school were some of the most profound and meaningful years of my life. At HUC, I was given the gift of studying every day with my talented classmates, and the gift of learning from a range of teachers who continue to shape the cantor I am and strive to be. Most importantly, I was given the gift to explore, experiment, and discover my passions and who I want to be as a cantor. It was during my time at HUC that I found my path towards helping to make the Jewish community a stronger and more whole community through inclusion.

After ordination, my husband, Jack, and I headed to the northern suburbs of Chicago, where we spent the past five years. While at Temple Beth-El, I had the opportunity to not only work with a great community and an extraordinary Rabbi, Sidney Helbraun who would become family to us, but to build community through an annual artist in residence series, to grow the music program at the synagogue, to create and implement new programs, worship experiences, and educational opportunities, to participate in local and national cantorial opportunities, and to expand my passion for creating communities of belonging for people with disabilities.

While I hope that I will grow and evolve as a Cantor and clergy person, I also hope that I will not lose sight of the vision, values, goals, and ideas that have driven me since deciding to become a Cantor: Creating a culture of belonging for all people and bridging the old with the new, which will ultimately build a strong and more complete Jewish community.

For many years now, I have been driven by a love of Jewish music, the music that came generations before me, and the new music that inspires and informs the future of Jewish music. I believe the Jewish community is not only stronger,

but continues to survive, and also thrives when we recognize the good that came before us, and use that to propel us towards a future that creates and reshapes Judaism so there is space for everyone. Music is an amazing tool for just this – bringing people together and fusing that which came before us with that which drives us to new places. For as many years as I have been driven by my love of Jewish music, I have also been driven by my passion for making the Jewish community more whole by welcoming in those Jews who have sat on the periphery of the community, in particular, those people with disabilities. I have dedicated much of my Cantorate to helping change the culture of the Jewish community to become fully inclusive of all people, working with congregations, the URJ, the ACC, and the CCAR to help build communities of belonging. This is a value that permeates my home life and my professional life, and I will continue to work hard to help MLRT and the Jewish community at large realize the fundamental Jewish value that no person should be left out of the Jewish community, and that no Jewish community is whole without the participation of each individual.

The work is not easy, and it cannot be done alone. I hope you will join me in working hard to help build and create community through a variety of opportunities, musical, educational, worship, employment, social, or otherwise, and I hope we will have every opportunity to be together at good times and bad, and everything in between.

After Jack and I welcomed our daughter, Hannah, in August 2016, we started talking about moving closer to home. When I learned of Cantor Portnoy's retirement, I decided to send in my resume and hope for the best. While we were exceedingly sad to say good bye to our Temple Beth-El family, we are happy to be home and are looking forward to many, many years of joy and blessings with the MLRT family.

### ■ High Holy Days

#### ■ Selichot

#### Saturday, September 1 | 8:15 pm

Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are serious holy days on our calendar. They are about looking at the direction of our lives and our world, taking stock, celebrating and sanctifying all that is good, and working to repair and mend that which is broken and that which can be made whole again. These are not easy matters; they take time and preparation.

The evening of Selichot is the beginning of this process. Selichot Services are held on the Saturday evening before Rosh Hashanah, this year Saturday, September 1. On Selichot (which literally refers to prayers of forgiveness recited at various times of the year), we begin the process of Teshuva, or repentance, return and repair. It is a time when the mood is quiet and introspective, when we begin the hard and serious work these holy days offer and demand. This year we will be joining as a community at Beth Am Israel Congregation, 1301 Hagys Ford Rd., Penn Valley. (see page 7 for more information).

#### Rosh Hashanah

#### Begins evening, Sunday, September 9

Rosh Hashanah is the Jewish New Year. In the book of Leviticus we read, "In the seventh month, on the first day of the month, you shall observe a complete rest, a holy day commemorated with loud blasts. You shall not work at your occupations."

On Rosh Hashanah, we celebrate the creation of the world and the counting of the years since the beginning of creation. This year we begin the Jewish year 5779. Even though we now know that the world is much older, in terms of Jewish tradition, we honor the rabbinic interpretation of the age of the world.

Rosh Hashanah combines both solemn and joyful elements. Another name for Rosh Hashanah is *Yom Hadin*, the Day of Judgment, when each of us is judged for our behavior during the past year. We also celebrate the arrival of a new year and the blessings it will hopefully contain.

#### ■ Tashlich Service on Rosh Hashanah

#### Monday, September 10 | 4:30 pm

The word "Tashlich" means, "You will cast away." It refers to a custom going back many centuries.

For many generations, Jews have gathered on the first day of Rosh Hashanah at bodies of water and recited the Tashlich prayer. This symbolizes our hope to get rid of our sins and for God to forgive us. There is a custom of putting bread crumbs into our pockets and shaking the crumbs into the water to express our desire to be free of our sins.

Please join us immediately after the Monday, September 10 Family Service on Rosh Hashanah at Shortridge Park (Shortridge Drive, between Remington Road and East Wynnewood Road) where we will have a short Tashlich Service starting at approximately 4:30 pm.

Should you bring kids? Absolutely – this is a child-friendly custom that kids will love to attend. Friends and neighbors are also welcome, so please join us.

### ■ Yom Kippur

#### Begins evening, Tuesday, September 18

Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, is the holiday that concludes the Days of Awe, a period of ten days that begins at Rosh Hashanah. This is a time for personal introspection and reflection on our behavior.

On Erev Yom Kippur, Kol Nidre, meaning "All Vows," is chanted at the start of the service. It is a formal statement that nullifies all unfulfilled vows—especially those made under great emotional stress. This nullification relates only to those vows that an individual voluntarily took upon himself or herself and that concern the relationship between oneself and God. No oath or promise involving another person, a community, or a court of justice is included in Kol Nidre.

The book of Jonah is read on the afternoon of Yom Kippur. The story of Jonah includes themes of personal responsibility and repentance. Often retold as a children's story, it has lessons for all of us. The prophet Jonah, after much reluctance, goes to the city of Nineveh to tell the people of their impending destruction because of their sins and transgressions. After hearing Jonah's prophecy, the people repent and God forgives them.

The messages of the story and this time of year are empowering. We learn that mistakes can be repaired, that there is always an opportunity to change, and that we have the power to heal through forgiving others.

### **■** Yom Kippur Afternoon Study Session Wednesday, September 19 | 2:30 pm

#### with Rabbi Richard Steinbrink

On most Friday evenings, we sing *Shalom Aleichem* and *Lecha Dodi*. In this study session, Rabbi Steinbrink will explore the history and meaning of these popular songs/prayers as well as the prayer that we frequently read during the silent prayer, *Elohai Netzur L'shoni Meyra*.

#### ■ Minchah & Ne'ilah

#### Wednesday, September 19 | 4:30 pm

We return to the Sanctuary on Yom Kippur afternoon for our *Minchah* (afternoon) Service. This service includes the Torah reading of the Holiness Code, Leviticus 19, and the Haftarah reading of the Book of Jonah.

Following Minchah, with the sun beginning to set, we continue with a service of Healing, Wholeness and Hope. We need healing in so many areas of our lives. All of us have the capacity to find strength and healing—if we attune ourselves to God's presence. At this service of healing, we reflect on the nature of God's healing presence in our bodies, our souls, our community and our world.

Ne'ilah (closing) is the final service of Yom Kippur day. The theme of this magnificent service is the closing of the Gates. While the Gates of Repentance and the opportunity for us to grow and change are never closed, we can use these moments to truly turn from the past toward a new path of wholeness and hope. "As evening falls, light dawns within us; hope and trust revive. The shadow that darkened our spirit is vanished; and through the passing cloud there breaks, with the last rays of the setting sun, the radiance of Your forgiving peace. We are restored, renewed by Your love." Our day of prayer ends with Havdallah and a final blast of the shofar at approximately 6:30 pm.

After gathering for a "nosh" and Havdallah, you will have the opportunity to study with our community's clergy on a topic related to the High Holy Days. Following an opening reception and Havdalah, we offer several options for Selichot worship: A participatory traditional davening service, a Reform Mishkan HaLev Service with the Community Choir, and a service featuring song and prayer. You are invited to a moving and meaningful evening of study, conversation and worship that will serve as a prelude to the High Holy Day season.

Note: Parking at the synagogue is very limited. You may drop off passengers at the lower door and park at the church lot on the corner of Tower Lane and Hagys Ford Road. A shuttle bus with be available to transport you to the synagogue and back to the parking lot at the end of the evening.

#### What is Selichot?

Selichot are prayers of forgiveness. Selichot are prayers that help us prepare for the High Holy Days. The themes and opportunities of these days are both joyful and serious: new beginnings, repentance, return, change, examining where we are in life; asking forgiveness of those we have hurt and of ourselves. Our tradition wisely understands that one cannot just "jump into" these opportunities without preparation, and without the company of others who are on a similar journey. That is why we begin before Rosh Hashanah with prayers, meditations and spiritual exercise called Selichot. In some Jewish traditions, Selichot prayers and meditations are said for the full month before Rosh Hashanah; in others, a few days before Rosh Hashanah. Either way, the intent is the same: it takes time and preparation to truly effect personal and communal growth, change and transformation. That's why we have Selichot, and that's also why we participate as a community in Selichot: it is a way to emphasize that before we return to our own community, or our own work of transformation, we join together as community, linking hearts and intentions with one another, strengthening one another.

### Sukkot

Sukkot, a Hebrew word meaning "booths" or "huts," refers to the annual Jewish festival of giving thanks for a bountiful fall harvest and commemorates the 40



years of Jewish wandering in the desert after the giving of the Torah atop Mt. Sinai.

Sukkot is celebrated five days after Yom Kippur and is marked by several distinct traditions, which includes erecting and dwelling in a sukkah (a temporary booth or hut). Sukkot (pl.) are commonly used during the seven-day festival for eating, entertaining and even for sleeping.

Sukkot, also called Z'man Simchateinu (Season of Our Rejoicing), is the only festival associated with an explicit commandment to rejoice. A final name for Sukkot is Chag HaAsif, (Festival of the Ingathering), representing a time to give thanks for the bounty of the earth during the fall harvest.

The eighth day of Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret, is traditionally a separate festival in its own right. In Reform congregations, which generally observe one day of holidays rather than two, Shemini Atzeret is observed concurrently with Simchat Torah, the festival of "rejoicing in the Torah."



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
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
