The story is told that when the Hasidic master, Reb Yitzchak Yakov, the Seer of Lublin, died, his disciples divided up his worldly goods. One got his books, one his kiddush cup, another his tallis. There remained one humble student, and he was eventually given the Seer's clock. On his way home, the disciple stopped at an inn. When he discovered he had no money to pay the innkeeper, he offered the Rebbe's clock as payment. The innkeeper then installed the clock in one of the rooms.

A year later, another of the Rebbe's Hasidim passed by and stayed at the inn. All night, he could not sleep. All night, the innkeeper heard the restless footsteps of the Hasid pacing the floor. In the morning, the Hasid confronted the innkeeper: "The clock, where did you get the clock?" The innkeeper related the story. "I knew it!," responded the Hasid. "This clock belonged to the Seer. It is a holy clock. All other clocks in the world mark time from the past – they measure us from where we've come. This clock ticks

toward the future. Every time I lay down to rest, the clock reminded me how much more there is to do before redemption can be realized."Like the Seer's clock, we look to the future and our shared sacred work to bring joy and connection to each other and the world.

Those moments of relationship are ever present. As Rosh Hashanah quickly approaches, we are reminded of all the challenges, uncertainties, and even some of the silver linings we experienced since last year's High Holy Days. Yet this cannot define our purpose or hinder our plans for the future. While this year's holiday experience will still not be "normal" due to ongoing COVID considerations, it will be our first opportunity to be together as a community in 18 months. We are excited to welcome you back to your Jewish home and share the time of prayer, reflection, song, and connection during these sacred days with you.

Israel Matters

We hear many stories of Israel's prominence in the formation of high tech start-ups, but here's a tale of one start-up that is more down to earth. A Bedouin father, Ibrahim Nsasra, learned that his children were skipping lunch at school because the food was so unfamiliar. He arranged with the Israeli Ministry of Education to provide meals cooked, initially, by four Bedouin women, and a new company, Nazid Impact Food, was born.

Today, the company employs 100 Bedouin men and women, providing them with a livelihood while feeding over 20,000 Jewish and Bedouin kids daily.

And speaking of food, Israeli scientists are developing a soy-based "milk" that contains the nutrients and energy essential to children's healthy growth, while providing the proteins found in cow's milk. The soy plant is hardy and easily grown, and will provide life-saving sustenance to impoverished populations throughout the world.

Every year at this time, we begin our mental, physical and emotional preparations for the holidays. This looks different for everyone; for some, it's the task of preparing a big family meal for Rosh Hashanah. For others, it's the act of asking for forgiveness from those whom they may have hurt during the year. For others yet, it might be hearing the shofar blown each morning during the month of Elul, reminding us of the upcoming Days of Awe and serving as a wakeup call for what is to come. And still, for many of us, it is a time when we think about the themes of the holiday season: justice, judgment and righteousness.

This time of year is a particularly reflective one, a time for us to think about the world around us, both large and small, and to consider our place in the world. As we all know, the world around us seems to be broken and battling each day for a ray of hope and a sliver of goodness. It gets

more and more difficult to read the news, more and more difficult to imagine a world that is whole, and more and more difficult to figure out what we can do to help. But, as we approach this holiday season, we can remember the words of Abraham, the words we read on Rosh Hashanah: "hineini, hineini," here I am, here I am. We are a nation divided on so many issues, and yet, hineini, here I am, ready to work for a more just world. Hineini, here I am, hopeful that we can see all that unites us rather than divides us. Hineini, here I am, standing before you this day, ready to listen, help, laugh, and cry. Hineini, here I am, ready to heed the call, whatever that may be.

As we move into the holiday season, as we begin our personal preparations, let us all consider how we can make space in our lives to simply be, to be present, and to work together to help the world around us. Can we spare 5 minutes to write letters to our political leaders when we see an injustice? Can we take an hour to help at a local school, business, or food pantry that might be serving the community? Do we have the courage to stand up to the person on the street using racial or prejudicial slurs? Can we take time each morning during the month of Elul to hear a shofar blown, to heed that call and to say hineini in the New Year?

While this year's Days of Awe may look different than those in year's past, our texts, the liturgy and Torah readings remain the same from year to year, from generation to generation. May you all, like Abraham, hear the call this year, and may you all find a way to say hineini, here I am. Wishing you all a happy and healthy New Year, and a 5782 of goodness. G'mar Chatima Tova – May you all be inscribed for a good year.



As we prepare to welcome the Jewish New Year 5782 we know our congregation, community and the world must continually adjust to new circumstances. Whatever those circumstances are, hineni, we are here for you and with you.

- For the health and safety of our community, capacity in all areas of MLRT will be limited to 40%. This means 408 seats for each of the Traditional, Contemporary, and Gesher Services.
- Regardless of vaccine status, anyone over the age of two must wear a face mask at ALL times while inside the Temple.
- Tickets are required for all services at the Temple and will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis. Ticket holders will only be admitted to the service(s) on their tickets. You must be a member in good standing and have completed your membership commitment 2021-22 to receive tickets.
- All services at MLRT will be Livestreamed. All members will receive an access password via email prior to Erev Rosh Hashanah to view the services. Additionally, videos will be archived on our website for later access.

Sukkot & Simchat Torah

Sukkot, a Hebrew word meaning "booths" or "huts," refers to the annual Jewish festival of giving thanks for a bountiful fall harvest and commemorates the 40 years of Jewish wandering in the desert after the giving of the Torah at Mt. Sinai. Sukkot is marked by several distinct traditions, including erecting and dwelling in a sukkah (a temporary booth or hut). Sukkot, also called Z'man Simchateinu (Season of Our Rejoicing), is the only festival with an explicit commandment to rejoice. We hope you will join us, in person and virtually, to celebrate and rejoice together.



Teach Our Children: Early Childhood Education

The Jewish tradition of tzedakah teaches the fundamentals of sharing. Anchored by tradition and deeprooted spirituality, here at MLRT ECE, we pass on the values of tzedakah generation after generation. Through stories and class discussions this past month, we all learned that in Judaism, the act of caring for others takes on many forms. Among those ways, tzedakah is an integral part. For example, in the first month of camp, all campers talked about the tradition of giving as a firm belief of doing justice and sharing the world's resources with people (or places) who have limited means.

Our campers and counselors explored the simple joy of helping one in need. Some of the campers brought in their own tzedakah boxes, and with a good heart, they donated their funds to the camp's tzedakah. Our oldest campers voted where the money should go on behalf of the entire camp. The voting process and the transparent conversation about giving to others involved children sharing ideas to do good deeds and the mitzvah of giving tzedakah. Unanimously, they decided that all funds

accumulated throughout the summer will help acquire new and exciting toys for children in need and help fund places where animals are rescued, loved, and cared for.

Additionally, we introduced our older campers to Maimonides, one of the most critical Jewish thinker, writer, and scholar in the world. Campers debated whether he was famous because of his exciting ideas or his explanation of the importance of giving tzedakah. They learned that Maimonides came up with the idea of different levels of giving and related it to a ladder; the lowest level representing that you are close to the ground, but you are going in the right direction. Giving tzedakah at the highest level is more intentional and involved than dropping a coin into a tzedakah box. The highest level of giving, according to Maimonides, is giving in a way that strengthens the recipient's hand so that he or she will not need to be dependent upon others in the future.

Our campers learned that while there are different levels of giving, all mitzvahs are noble and should be treated as good deeds without ranking one above the other as better or more important. We hope they will take that lesson and apply it to all acts of kindness in the future.

With the collective effort of counselors, staff, clergy, and your family, the habit of sharing and giving *tzedakah* should become second nature for our campers. As children respond well to role models and positive reinforcement, the gesture of watching or participating with friends in small moments of caring is the foundation of keeping on that habit for the rest of their lives. We thank you all for leading and modeling these acts of generosity in our campers' lives.

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


