The world around us, along with the creatures, environment and people we share our world with, go through change. It comforts me that we are not alone through this process. Some may be in the same stage as my family (partial empty-nesters), others may be sending their little ones off to kindergarten, elementary or middle school, and others may be walking their kids down the aisle. I truly did blink my eyes and my daughter is off at college, mostly on her own and figuring out what it means to be a young adult. It really was just yesterday that I felt her kick inside of me and was bringing her home from the hospital and Neil and I were arguing over who was going

to push her in the stroller. My only advice and ask of you all is to enjoy each and every stage and season for the beauty and specialness that it brings. My family and I look forward to moving through the seasons with each other and with each of you.

October 8 is the 27<sup>th</sup> anniversary of my Bat Mitzvah. Though nearly three decades ago (the number is insignificant, though any Gematria scholars out there are free to correct me on that point) I have very clear and distinct memories of that day and the days leading up to it. I suppose one could argue that those moments were transformative in many ways - some led me to question what I had been taught about Judaism, some led me in the pursuit of Jewish music, and some led me to a love of Torah. October 8, 1994 was Parashat Noach, and each year I reflect on the portion with great fondness and with a different lens because I have been studying the portion for nearly three decades.

I am writing this bulletin in September, not yet the High Holy Days, and it feels as if the world is imploding. Abortion rights are at stake, we have left Afghanistan, Covid is still running wild, wildfires are raging, Ida has just destroyed communities, and in many ways it feels as if the world is in utter chaos. And yet, after chaos comes calm and beauty. This year, in thinking about Noach, I am reminded of all the chaos that existed at that time. Before the flood, there was chaos in the behavior of the people. During the flood there was chaos in the destruction of the world. After the world repopulated, there was once again chaos in the building of the Tower of Babel. But, there was also a rainbow, a sign of God's love and commitment to humanity. And after the tower, we meet Abraham, a person who was so righteous and filled with goodness that he is chosen to be the leader of our people. I desperately hope that by the time this bulletin hits your door we will be on a path to finding a way out of the chaos, but if not, I hope and pray that together we will stay the course and work together to find a path to righteousness, positivity, and goodness.

# Sit Down with Rabbi Newburge & Amy Krulik

There is no better way to get to know a person than spending time with them. Since we can't all sit down with Rabbi Geri Newburge and Executive Director Amy Krulik, they decided to interview each other for this month's MLRTMatters. What follows is their questions, their words, and their essence. We hope you enjoy getting to know two of our Temple leaders on a different level!

As we enter the new year 5782, we are reminded to tend to our relationships. There is a wonderful lesson taught by Rabbi Yitzhak Eisik, who said: "The motto of life is 'Give and take.' Everyone must be both a giver and receiver. One who is not both is as barren as a tree." Like all good relationships there is an ebb and flow, some give and some get. We love this model of sharing the giving and the taking. Over the first six months that we have been working together, we've learned so much from each other. Here are just a few highlights!

## ◆ As a transplant to the Philadelphia area, what do you love most about living in the region?

**Rabbi Geri Newburge (RGN):** I love that Philly is such an approachable, manageable city. You can be in Rittenhouse in the morning and South Philly in the afternoon. There is a variety of everything – restaurants, stores, sports teams - and we are in close proximity to every kind of experience. Whether you love time in a big city or more rural pursuits, your heart's desire is never more than an hour away. I also think we are both open to joys of the Philadelphia area because we weren't born here—we married into life in this great community.

## ◆ Where do you want to retire?

RGN: Either an accessible small city or on a ranch with lots of property, preferably below the Mason-Dixon line. As much as I love Philadelphia, I want to retire where it's warm and snow-free.

AK: Walkable city with changing seasons, fabulous restaurants and lots of street festivals. Center City, here I come!

## ◆ What attracted you to MLRT?

RGN: MLRT has an amazing culture of excellence. We – the clergy, board, volunteers and staff – work together every day to create the best possible Jewish experiences for our community.

AK: The commitment and engagement of volunteers at MLRT is remarkable. It is easy to take this engagement for granted, but I can assure you that what happens at MLRT is rare and exemplary.

## ◆ What continues to serve as inspiration to you?

RGN: I am now in my 19<sup>th</sup> year as a Rabbi and one of the greatest privileges I have is forming powerful relationships with families in our community. I am now doing baby namings for parents who my students when they were in 7<sup>th</sup> grade. These bonds are a critical source of inspiration for me.

AK: My mom's family has always been heavily involved in Jewish communal life and I love carrying on my family's commitment to strengthening our Jewish community for future generations.

## ◆ What have been some silver linings of COVID?

RGN: COVID has offered many silver linings. Here are my personal favorites: backyard B'nai Mitzvahs, enjoying three meals a day with my son Jay, working closely with ECE families, starting the Keeping it Reel Club and leading my Sunday morning Religious School class.

AK: Professionally, one of the best gifts of COVID is that nearly 100% of people attend meetings on Zoom nearly 100% of the time. It doesn't matter if you are traveling or the weather is terrible, you can hop on a call from anywhere. Personally, my daughter, who lives in Washington, DC, moved home for a few months at the beginning of COVID and I am grateful for the time we had together.

Nostalgia from the traditional founders of the resort merge with ideas from the millennial grandchildren to create a story that all readers of all ages will enjoy. The book is humorous while raising questions about change and how different generations adjust to change.
- [Eternal](#) by Lisa Scottoline. This beloved Philadelphia author of law and crime fiction wrote a gripping story of the Holocaust in Rome, Italy during the time of Mussolini. Ms. Scottoline spoke virtually at our Temple in June to an eager and large hometown crowd. Her book is filled with enticing descriptions of Italy and Italian food and is a must-read for lovers of historical fiction.

## HASSEL ADULT EDUCATION LECTURE WITH JODI EICHLER-LEVINE: [STITCHING OUR WAY TO SURVIVAL: JEWISH WOMEN AND CRAFTS](#)

*Sunday, October 10 at 10:00 am*

Jodi Eichler-Levine is the Berman Professor of Jewish Civilization and professor of religion studies at Lehigh University. She is the author of [Painted Pomegranates and Needlepoint Rabbis: How Jews Craft Resilience and Create Community](#): building upon three years of ethnography around the U.S., this book explores how everyday acts of creativity are a crucial part of making religious lives. Craftmaking is nothing less than an act of generative resilience that fosters survival. Whether taking place in such groups as the Pomegranate Guild of Judaic Needlework or the Jewish Hearts for Pittsburgh, or in a home studio, these everyday acts of creativity—yielding a needlepoint rabbi, say, or a handkerchief embroidered with the Hebrew words tikkun olam—are a crucial part what makes a religious life.

Her work on lived religion and popular culture has appeared in The Washington Post, Salon, Newsweek, Religion Dispatches, Killing the Buddha, and many other outlets.

## **LETTERS TO MY PALESTINIAN NEIGHBOR BOOK DISCUSSION WITH YOSSI KLEIN HALEVI**

**MONDAY, OCTOBER 18 AT 7:00 PM**  
In-person discussion at MLRT and on Zoom

Yossi Klein Halevi, a New York Times bestselling author and a senior fellow at the Shalom Hartman Institute in Jerusalem, will be our guest speaker on Monday, October 18 in a joint program with Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church. Halevi will discuss his recent book, Letters to My Palestinian Neighbor, and the project that has grown up around it, in person at MLRT and on Zoom.

Together with Imam Abdullah Antepli of Duke University, Halevi co-directs the Institute's Muslim Leadership Initiative, which teaches emerging young Muslim American leaders about Judaism, Jewish identity and Israel. His first book, Memoirs of a Jewish Extremist, tells the story of his teenage years as a follower of the militant rightwing rabbi Meir Kahane, and his subsequent disillusionment with Jewish radicalism. The New York Times called it "a book of burning importance." Halevi's 2013 book, Like Dreamers, won the Jewish Book Council's Everett Book of the Year Award. His latest book, Letters to My Palestinian Neighbor, is a New York Times bestseller.

Halevi writes for leading op-ed pages in the United States, including *The New York Times* and the *Wall Street Journal*, and is a former contributing editor to the *New Republic*. Born in Brooklyn, he moved to Israel in 1982, and lives in Jerusalem with wife, Sarah, who helps run a center for Jewish meditation.

We also hosted an evening of learning led by Yolanda Savage-Narva, the new director of Racial Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (REDI) for the Union for Reform Judaism.



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
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
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# Special Shabbat Speakers

October is National Domestic Violence Awareness Month. The Jewish community has become increasingly aware of, and responsive to, issues of intimate partner and family abuse in Jewish households. But there is often an absence both of information about, and best and safe practices for responding, to abuse. 
