Who doesn't love a hamantashen? I think we'd all happily do the dishes for this culinary favorite. Apricot, cherry, even pizza- they're all delicious, though the story of how the hamantashen came to be remains murky. While hamantashen may be the tastiest part of Purim, it is hardly the most important.

Purim is a lesson about a good deed that really all began on the eve of Esther becoming queen. Of course, becoming queen wasn't exactly on her radar, but since Esther wasn't a nun or a kook, Mordechai knew she'd make an excellent bride for King Ahashverosh, and he wanted to refer her to the beauty contest being held. She was worried that the king would not see her as on the same level, but soon enough Esther was the apple of the king's eye and she could do no wrong. Of all the Jewish sagas, this one has a happy ending! (How many palindromes can you find in this paragraph?)

According to the rabbis in the Talmud, "Once Adar begins, happiness increases." ## What Does Your Hamantashen Say About You?

Did you know that the Monell Center, the world's only independent, non-profit scientific institute dedicated to research on the senses of taste and smell, is located at 35th & Market Streets in Philadelphia? Researchers at Monell are working on ways that the science of taste shapes our food choices, affects our metabolism and helps develop products that will best meet our personal preferences and nutritional needs. While the Monell Center has not specifically studied why we like one flavor of hamantashen over another, some of their recent research has examined why we favor sweet foods and the importance of savory and bitter foods in our diet.

Thanks to inspiration from the great work happening at the Monell Center (check them out at monell.org) and the ridiculous practice of Food Astrology (yes, this is a thing), I have culled the

Googleverse to determine the personality traits of the most popular flavors of hamantashen. Before you see if you and your hamantashen are a match, a few disclaimers: This information has not been peer reviewed and nothing that follows is based on a single scientific fact.

What's Your Hamantashen Personality?

- Strawberry: Tolerant, devoted, energetic, and fiercely loyal.
- Chocolate: Dramatic, lively, charming, and flirtatious.
- Cherry: Kind, imaginative, creative, loyal, and sincere.
- Apricot: Generous, cultured, fearless, focused, and good sense of humor.
- Prune: Quiet, reserved, mature, and great organizational skills.
- Poppy (Mun): Traditionalist, honest, engaging and a good listener.

Although making hamantashen will not satisfy my year-long commitment to baking with yeast (my recent whole wheat challah was a hit), Purim at the Krulik's is not complete without batches of strawberry, apricot, and chocolate hamantashen. Here is the recipe I have been using since my kids were in preschool – happy baking and HAPPY PURIM!

#### **INGREDIENTS**

1/4 pound softened butter or margarine 34 cup of sugar

2 eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract ¼ cup orange juice

2 teaspoons baking powder

3-4 cups of flour

Variety of fillings – fruit preserves, pie

fillings, chocolate chips, Nutella...

it's Purim, go wild!

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Mix together butter/margarine, sugar, eggs, vanilla and orange juice.

Add baking powder and flour. Start with 3 cups of flour and then add additional flour as needed to create a dough that is not sticky.

Roll the dough to ¼ inch thickness (using the remaining flour to help with rolling) and cut into circles (about 3" diameter) using a cookie cutter or a glass.

Place about a teaspoon of filling in the middle of each circle and pinch edges together to form a triangle (some filling will be visible).

- Bake on a greased or parchment paper covered cookie sheet for 12-25 minutes until cookies are light golden brown. Be sure to check the cookies – baking time varies based on thickness of dough.
- Cool and enjoy.

Yields approximately 4 dozen hamantashen

# Purim 5782/2022

With celebrations including costumes, skits and songs, noisemakers, and gifts of food, Purim is definitely full of fun! The main communal celebration involves a public reading—usually in the synagogue—of the Book of Esther (Megillat Esther), which tells the story of the holiday: Under the rule of King Ahashverosh, Haman, the king's adviser, plots to exterminate all of the Jews of Persia. His plan is foiled by Queen Esther and her cousin, Mordechai, who ultimately save the Jews of Persia from destruction. The significance of Purim lies not so much in how it began, but in what it has become: a thankful and joyous affirmation of Jewish survival.

If you are hoping to travel to Israel in the next year, consider spending time at Mount Hermon in the Golan Heights. You may not think of Israel as a ski destination, but 50,000 skiers and snowboarders make their way each year to the Mount Hermon Ski Resort, the highest point and only ski area in Israel. The story is inspired by harrowing true stories. We are at the time in history when the untold tales of the Holocaust are coming to our attention. It is important for us to hear these stories as we continue to acquire a complete picture of that terrible time.

Pam is the author of several books of historical fiction, many of which can be found in our Temple library. Pam's novels are inspired by her experiences as a diplomat for the State Department handling Holocaust issues in Poland. 

# Brotherhood

Alfred Lord Tennyson, in In Memoriam insists that "There lives more faith in honest doubt, / Believe me, than in half the creeds." But doubt not, Brothers and Sisters, a creed steadfastly held by Brotherhood is the giving of service to our congregation; which is what we will fulfill, once again, when we lead the multi-access Friday Night Shabbat Service on March 11. Be on the look-out for additional information in the weekly emails.

We will gather on March 13 to assist in whatever way we can at the Purim Carnival. This is the event at which Glenn Brooks displays all of his years of chemistry teacher training to boil those hot dogs to perfection. Look for more information about how to participate soon.

You may be familiar with the Women of the Wall (WOW), the leading organization to rid the Kotel of exclusionary actions against women. The Men of Reform Judaism (MRJ) in mid-January presented yet another timely webinar to Reform movement congregations; you all were invited to take advantage of the event, an event made possible because our Brotherhood participates with financial sponsorship of our national organization; and this is but one way we all benefit from MRJ. Two truly astounding women whose work is crucial to bringing about a more equitable society in Israel, Anat Hoffman, Executive Director, and Orly Erez-Likhovski, Director of Israel Religious Action Center (IRAC), each spoke of their work with the WOW movement, now 34 years young. They cited innumerable instances of the monopoly the Orthodox leaders and communities continue to have on the daily lives of ordinary Israeli citizens, especially women. Consider that, at the Kotel, women are searched by "ushers" and Kotel police for Torahs; that women are excluded from radio station participation alongside Orthodox men; that land acquisition from the State by Reform synagogues gets clogged in the court system; that some Orthodox rabbis consider Arabs less than human. Both Hoffman and Erez-Likhovski implored North American Jews to relinquish their role as silent bystanders and insist that we, too, have a voice in creating a more just and equitable Israeli society. "Speaking perfect Hebrew does not a Jew make," Hoffman said; to our peril, we should not deny the truth of that observation.

## Teach Our Children: ECE

An extraordinary Childhood Purim Experience and the Joy of Capturing Our Imagination

Purim was always a big deal growing up (mainly) in Romania (Transylvania). Everything was magic and very meaningful to us as children, from choosing your costume to fussing over a mischloach manot. Working on the little Purim gifts baskets containing treats that we exchanged and shared with neighbors, friends, family, and the needy on Purim marked a beautiful moment from my childhood. The fun events that were often staged in our little shul yard with games and activities made for a festive and spirited day.

I'm still disappointed with my childhood self for always wanting to be a princess and proud of my mom for trying to push me in different directions when we would start working on my costume or my brothers' costumes. But that was when I learned about the joy of having us create our costumes

and one of my favorite ways to make "art" using recycled materials or reusing things for new purposes. So, one year, we created these Royal Crowns, a craft you can do at home with your children, using felt made from recycled pieces of fabrics easy to find in any house. Then, after lots of love and use, you can recycle your creations again.

1. Decorate two paper plates with whatever craft supplies you have around the house - markers, crayons, paint, feathers, jewels, etc
2. Put beans, rice, beads, or macaroni in one plate
3. Glue the popsicle stick to the inside of the filled plate
4. Seal both plates together with glue all around the rims and let dry completely before shaking at Haman (can also use staples)

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
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
