Israel Matters

In 2013, a group of Arab women from East Jerusalem decided they wanted to study Hebrew. Unable to find a program, they invited two Jewish students from Hebrew University to teach them and that's how the "Women Speaking Hebrew" program began. By 2015, the growing demand led to the establishment of a non-profit, Lissan, whose mission is to increase accessibility to Jerusalem's two spoken languages, Hebrew and Arabic. 60% of Jerusalem's 927,000 residents are Jewish and most live in West Jerusalem. 40% are Arab and mostly live in East Jerusalem. While almost 90% of Arab men can speak Hebrew, only one-third of Arab women currently can as Hebrew is not traditionally taught in east Jerusalem schools.

Lissan waives all fees for women who cannot pay the registration cost. Currently, there are 40 volunteer teachers, * coordinators, and 400 female students ranging from beginner to advanced. The ratio of one instructor for every five students allows for the regular practice of conversational skills in Hebrew, making it easier for the Arab women to navigate the bureaucratic challenges of daily life. Lissan also teaches Arabic to medical teams from the western part of the city who render services in East Jerusalem. Lissan is another positive example of creating better understanding and communication between Arabs and Jews in action.

Celebrate and Consecrate

It's inspiring to walk down memory lane at Main Line Reform Temple-Beth Elohim, and I have the good fortune to do it every day. Our famous wall in the hallway leading to the Sanctuary has pictures of all the Confirmation classes, starting from the earliest days of the congregation. Oftentimes, we find people of all ages wandering before the framed pictures on Shabbat, trying to find themselves or a family member. There is, understandably, great pride in finding one's picture amongst the smiling faces.

We are excited to add to the illustrious wall honoring the 21 incredible Confirmands this year. On Sunday, June 5, our 10th graders will lead us in Shavuot Services, celebrating the giving and receiving of the Torah. It is an appropriate time to mark their maturation and education since their B'nai Mitzvah.

The rabbis teach that Moses shared a reflection from the Israelites' time at Mount Sinai at the end of their forty years of wandering. They draw their teaching from Deuteronomy 5:23 when Moses says, "As who is it, from all flesh that heard the voice of the living God speak from amidst the fire," meaning the Israelites would hear God's voice and live, but if any idolaters heard they would die. Furthermore, the rabbis asserted, "Come and see how the Voice would go out among all of Israel - each and every one according to his strength: the elders according to their strength; the young men according to their strength; the infants according to their strength; the women according to their strength; and even Moses according to his strength." Here the rabbis drive home the point that every individual at Sinai was able to receive the Torah in a way they understood, everyone from an infant to Moses.

As we have studied with our Confirmands in the years since their B'nai Mitzvah, we have watched them grow into thoughtful, engaged adults who each have their own understanding of the Torah. This group of young adults will share their wisdom with us at the service, and should be especially feted as they have faced the unprecedented challenge of continuing their Jewish education through the pandemic, and we can finally return to our in person observance of the holiday and Confirmation (it will also be available on our Livestream). On Shavuot, the Jewish community throughout the world carries on the tradition of accepting the Torah. Please join us on Sunday, June 5 at 10:00 am to join the celebration.

2022 has been a momentous year for women in many ways. Maya Angelou became the first woman of color to appear on the US quarter; Honduras elected its first female President; Pakistan appointed its first female Supreme Court Judge; Jane Campion was the first woman nominated for multiple Oscars for best director; and Ketanji Brown Jackson was appointed as the first Black woman to serve as a US Supreme Court Judge. 2022 also marked the 100th anniversary of the first Bat Mitzvah and the 50th anniversary of the first female ordained as a rabbi. Here at Main Line Reform Temple Beth Elohim, 2022 could be called the year of the woman.

Last summer, we put a note in a bulletin about an adult B'nai Mitzvah class. Many people, all identifying as females, responded positively, forming our current adult B'not (all female) Mitzvah class. Beginning in September, the women in our adult B'not Mitzvah class dedicated themselves to

immersive study, learning Hebrew, studying the meaning and context of our liturgy, learning about rituals and Jewish law, learning about Torah, and building a unique and special cohort community. The six women who will become adult B'not Mitzvah together have not only added value and friendship to one another's lives but have added incredible value to my life. It has been a gift to spend each Wednesday morning with this group of smart, excited, talented, and thoughtful women.

Please join us in celebration on Friday night, June 17, at 8:00 pm as the class is formally called to the Torah as B'not Mitzvah. The adult B'not Mitzvah will be the perfect culmination of a remarkable year of study and work.

Belonging is a fundamental part of being human. A recent MIT study found that we crave interactions with other people in the same region of our brains where we crave food. In fact, we may think of relationships with other people as the icing on the cake, but these relationships are actually the cake itself.

A sense of belonging is crucial to our life satisfaction, happiness, mental and physical health and even longevity. That same MIT study found that a loss of belonging has been associated with stress, illness, decreased wellbeing, and depression. Being part of an engaging community gives us a sense of belonging and can make us feel as though we are a part of something greater than ourselves.

There is no question that the pandemic has exacerbated our need for belonging and mental health professionals recommend that we be intentional about creating opportunities for belonging.

Here are some steps you can take:

- Be Part of Something. Build your friendships by joining a group with which you feel a common sense of purpose and solidarity. Check out MLRT's myriad of committees, adult education classes, Sisterhood & Brotherhood or fun social groups like Beer Club.
- Be patient. It might take time to gain acceptance, attention, and support from members of the group. Some MLRT groups meet weekly and other just a few times a year. Each time you connect with a group, you are strengthening relationships with new friends and old.
- Practice acceptance. Focus on the similarities, not the differences, that connect you to others, and remain open to new ways of thinking. There is an old adage that if you ask two Jews a question, you will get three opinions. The diversity of the MLRT community makes for interesting conversations every day.

RABBI DAVID STRAUS

David Straus has been the Senior Rabbi at Main Line Reform Temple Beth Elohim since July 1998 - only the fourth rabbi to serve in this position at MLRT. Prior to his 24 years at MLRT, Rabbi Straus served congregations in Trenton, NJ; Cleveland, OH; and Washington, DC.

Rabbi Straus is active in the Jewish and non-Jewish community. He is a past president of the VAAD: The Philadelphia Board of Rabbis, and served as chair of the Community Relations Committee of the Jewish Community Relations Council from 2010-2014. He is a co-convener of the Religious Leaders Council of Greater Philadelphia and the chair of the National Council of Synagogues which meets regularly with members of the US Catholic Conference of Bishops, National Council of Churches, and the Evangelical Community. He has served on the board of Philabundance, the advisory committee of Eldernet of Lower Merion, and the Jewish Community Federation of Philadelphia.



BRET STEPHENS

Bret Stephens began his career at The Wall Street Journal in 1998 as an editor in New York and later as a writer and editor in Brussels. At 28 years old, he was named editor-in-chief of the Jerusalem Post. He has reported stories from around the world and interviewed dozens of world leaders.

In 2017, he became a regular political analyst for MSNBC and an op-ed columnist and associate editor for the New York Times. Mr. Stephens was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for distinguished commentary for his work as the author of "Global View," the WSJ's foreign-affairs column. He also served eight years as the Journal's deputy editorial-page editor, responsible for the newspaper's global opinion section, as well as a member of the editorial board.

In 2014, Mr. Stephens published his book, <u>America in</u> Retreat: The New Isolationism and the Coming Global <u>Disorder</u> and was awarded the Professional Achievement Prize by the University of Chicago, a distinction he shares with composer Philip Glass, astronomer Carl Sagan and Nobel laureate Gary Becker.



RABBI JONAH PESNER

Rabbi Jonah Pesner serves as the Director of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism and as Senior Vice President of the Union for Reform Judaism, a position to which he was appointed to in 2011. Named one of the most influential rabbis in America by Newsweek magazine,

he is an inspirational leader and tireless advocate for social justice. In 2006, he founded Just Congregations (now incorporated into the Religious Action Center), which engaged clergy, professional, and volunteer leaders in interfaith efforts in pursuit of social justice. Over the course of his career, Rabbi Pesner has also led and supported campaigns for health care reform, racial justice, economic opportunity, immigration reform, LGBTQ equality, human rights, and a variety of other causes.

Rabbi Pesner will celebrate Rabbi Straus, who has devoted his rabbinate to building a dynamic Jewish community, working in relationship across lines of race and faith to pursue justice. Join us for this special Friday Night Service!

May and June Holidays

On May 14, 1948, soon-to-be Prime Minister David Ben Gurion declared the independence of the State of Israel, which was recognized by the United States, the Soviet Union, and other countries, though not by the surrounding Arab states. Yom Ha'Atzmaut (Israeli Independence Day) marks the anniversary of the establishment of the modern state of Israel. It is observed on or near the 5th of the Hebrew month of Iyar on the Jewish calendar, which usually falls in April.

Yom Ha'Atzmaut in Israel is always preceded by Yom HaZikaron-Memorial Day for the Fallen Soldiers. The message of linking these two days is clear: Israelis owe their independence-the very existence of the state-to the soldiers who sacrificed their lives for it.

Since the establishment of the State of Israel in 1948, four new holidays have been added to the Jewish calendar – Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day), Yom HaZikaron (Memorial Day), Yom Ha'Atzmaut (Independence Day), and Yom Y'rushalayim (Jerusalem Day, which celebrates the reunification of the city in 1967).

The Israeli Knesset (parliament) established the day that precedes Yom Ha'Atzmaut as Yom HaZikaron, a day to memorialize soldiers who lost their lives fighting in the War of Independence and subsequent battles, as well as a day to remember civilian victims of terrorism.¹

Hineini, We are Here! We hope you will stay 'here' at MLRT after the service for some snacks and socializing with your MLRT family and the 2023 Confirmands.

Shavuot celebrates the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai and encourages us to embrace the Torah's teachings and be inspired by the wisdom that Jewish tradition has to offer. Shavuot is Hebrew for "weeks," and the holiday occurs seven weeks after Passover.

Unlike Passover, with Seder, or Sukkot, with the building of the Sukkah or waving of the lulav and etrog, there are few rituals, either synagogue-based or home-centered associated with Shavuot. In ancient times, Shavuot was a pilgrimage festival during which Israelites brought crop offerings to the Temple in Jerusalem. Today, it is a celebration of Torah, education, and the choice to participate actively in Jewish life.

Our Tikkun Leil Shavuot programming is still being finalized at the time of printing but the information about our learning sessions will hit your inboxes shortly!

Confirmation 2022

Jewish tradition focuses on the sanctity of life and time. On Sunday, June 5, we will have the opportunity to consecrate both during the holiday of Shavuot, a pilgrimage festival for our ancestors, who travelled to Jerusalem with their wheat harvest as an offering, and commemorates the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai.

From the 1880's through the 1920's, Jewish immigrants from Eastern Europe populated the area bounded by Spruce, Christian Street, 2nd, and 6th. There, they created a vibrant community with its own Yiddish Theater, literary societies, and newspapers, along with synagogues, banks, bath houses and delicatessens. 

FROM DOCTOR TO PATIENT: ELLIOTT SCHULMAN'S BATTLE WITH PANCREATIC CANCER



Teach Our Children: ECE

The sincerest tribute to YOU ALL!

Again, we are gathered "in words" to celebrate the year and give thanks to our children, families, staff, and MLRT colleagues as we all worked hard to get closer to the finish line of another school year. A sincere THANK YOU to you all as we enter the last two months of the current school year.

It has been another exciting and uniquely challenging year as we created goals with our young children in mind. Here is what we accomplished throughout this school year.

Together with their teachers, our young children have participated in yearlong 'imaginative language and pretend situations,' where they explored things in the world, including ideas, that they find meaningful. Children's motivation to construct knowledge and learn from others was directly tied to personal interests and the support they received from the learning environment of their teachers and their peers. The children actively participated in constructing the monthly and yearly learning goals. Teachers and children were equal partners in creating opportunities, affirming significance, and generating new lines of thought. Every emergent unit of study and its four to six-week project trajectory started in the burgeoning ideas and feelings that stir beneath every young child's consciousness.

We have identified 'friendship' as a dominant theme of early schooling that is deeply connected to the appropriate development for young children. The interpersonal communication required to sustain fantasy play helped children practice what it takes to be friends in real life. Practicing the overall requirements of the play – the initial agreement to participate, the creation of a scene and objective, and the continuous negotiation between players that is necessary for it to proceed – our children have multiple daily opportunities to practive the push me/pull you terrain inherent in friendship.

As we progressed in the year, each classroom and every age group recognized the power of storytelling as one of the driving forces to meeting young children at their best. From authors' studies in all two-year-old classrooms to a balanced literacy curriculum in kindergarten, storytelling has been a vivid presence in the children's daily activities. It invited children to acquire interest in how stories work, where stories come from, what tales are composed of, sequencing, plot development, characterization, writing process, authorial intention (the last three traits mostly for our older three years old, pre-k, and kindergarten), and use of imagination.

It is again an absolute pleasure to be able to invite you 'celebrate' the year that we are about to leave behind. I am humbled and proud to be able to close out this school year. I know that I am beyond fortunate to be surrounded by this wonderful school community. The drive, passion, and determination underpinned by skills, knowledge, and empathy among all community members helped raise progress and achievement within our school.

While we approach the last day of school on June 10, all of us here at Main Line Reform Temple School for Early Childhood Education, wish you peace of mind, prosperity through the rest of the year, happiness that multiplies, health for you and yours, fun around every corner, energy to chase your dreams, and joy to fill your summertime.

We are excited to see many of our students at MLRT Camp ECE this summer - where the fun happens!

We can't wait to see you all back in the fall and embark on our continued journey to educate, love, and care for our young generations.


