Rabbi Geri Newburge

In May 1997, I drove cross country from Los Angeles to South Florida with my brother Scott. Our first stop was the southern rim of the Grand Canyon. It was spectacular- to see with our own eyes what nature created over millions and millions of years!

My family visited the Grand Canyon this summer and it was just as incredible as I remembered from 25 years ago, though with significantly more tourists and tourist services, but the visit connected the past with the present in a deeply meaningful way. Eric and I were able to share with our son, the next generation, the tremendous beauty of a National Park and an appreciation for one of the wonders of the world.

In some ways, the phenomenon we call the Grand Canyon began two billion years ago with the formation of the igneous and metamorphic rocks. Above these rocks lie layer upon layer of sedimentary rock, each contributing a unique part of the environmental history of the Grand Canyon region. Then, the region was "uplifted" between 70 and 30 million years ago because of plate tectonics, resulting in the high ,and relatively flat, Colorado Plateau. Beginning just 5-6 million years ago, the Colorado River began to carve its way downward. Even after all this time, the forces of nature are at work slowly deepening and widening the Grand Canyon, and revealing ever-new layers of the earth.

We cannot fathom this kind of time elapsing and the effects it has on nature until we see witness it. Time has become a more peculiar thing during the age of Covid, and as we prepare for a new year, 5783, we consider the effects it has had on each of us and on our congregation, bringing unprecedented challenges as well as new opportunities to learn, teach, and connect. Though a little younger than the Grand Canyon, MLRT has had its own evolution over the last 70 years, as every person and family lent their unique contribution to the synagogue. It's hard to believe we missed the last two years together for the High Holy Days, but as we continue to evolve with the world around us, we cannot wait to share 5783 with you.

A thousand years ago, the Roman poet Seneca provided the inspiration for the proverb that, "absence makes the heart grow fonder." As we approach the High Holy Days, these words seem to ring truer than ever, and we are extraordinarily excited to welcome people to High Holy Day services and all the 70th year of MLRT has to offer.

Wishing you and yours good health, joy, and peace in the new year.

MLRT's Milestone Year

What do The Today Show, the electronic walk/don't walk sign, the movie Singing in the Rain, and MLRT all have in common? Each can trace its start to 1952. In 1952, a year when stamps cost just \$0.03 and gas was \$0.20/gallon, 55 Main Line-area families joined together to establish a unique religious center that would serve the needs of its members while allowing

those members to serve the needs of others. Over the last 70 years, the price of stamps and gas have risen by about 95%, and so too has membership at MLRT.

Research tells us that it is important to our happiness, motivation and overall mental health to give each other, and ourselves, a high-five once in a while! A number of recent studies have found that celebrating brings significant benefits, including improved physical health and better coping strategies. This idea of savoring — noticing, appreciating, and enhancing positive experiences — is often used to increase feelings of self-worth and overall life satisfaction and to promote creativity, resilience, and social connection. People who take time to reflect on — and celebrate — their successes are generally more optimistic, take better care of themselves and tend to be less stressed. Celebrations can increase your sense of well-being, regardless of socioeconomic factors, education, age, or gender.

The last 70 years haven't always been easy, but it is amazing what the vision of a small group of passionate people has become. We have graduated over 5,000

students from our Early Childhood Education and Religious School programs and celebrated over 3,000 B'nai Mitzvah, weddings, and baby namings. The 825+ diverse families that now call MLRT home make us the largest Reform congregation on the Main Line. The story of MLRT is truly remarkable.

There is no question that we have been thrown some exceptionally big curveballs over the past couple of years, which makes our 70th anniversary especially important. The strength and warmth of our congregation is something worth celebrating. Our commitment to honoring the legacy of our founding families is worth celebrating. The dedicated lay leaders, clergy, and staff who work tirelessly to create dynamic program and worship experiences are worth celebrating. And the opportunity to launch our next 70 years with renewed optimism is worth celebrating.

MLRT@70 is a year-long celebration of all that we have accomplished and will accomplish...together. Israel Matters

Among the many people waiting to escape the horrors of war in Ukraine were two infants born via surrogates to Israeli parents. How they were finally rescued and united with their parents is a story that has the suspense and intrigue of a James Bond film. An Israeli team based in Moldova providing humanitarian aid and emergency medical care to Ukrainian refugees was notified that a newborn was abandoned by a surrogate in a hospital in Kyiv, and would be placed in an orphanage if not removed. Through various connections, the Israelis located a doctor who was willing to take the baby to a meeting place where an ambulance would bring the child to the border of Moldova. Together with Israeli diplomats and helpful border police, the baby crossed into Moldova. However, the airport was closed, and they had to spend another ten hours driving to an airport in Romania, where the Israeli parents finally met their newborn. Onboard their flight to Romania was a second set of parents coming to rescue their child, and thus began another harrowing, but successful bringing together of frantic parents and innocent babies caught in the ravages of war.

The story for October 13 will be "The Ukraine" by Artem Chapeye, a Ukrainian writer, reporter, translator and activist His work has been translated into seven languages and has appeared in the Best European Fiction anthology. New (School) Year/New Beginning

Rosh Hashanah — the Jewish New Year — and the beginning of the school year often coincide, and, in many ways, the timing is apropos. The Jewish New Year is about introspection and setting goals for the coming year, and as millions of families around the country prepare for the next school year, they are doing the same. As educators, we also assess our goals and share them with families. With summer at an end, many of us experience a pang of nostalgia for the excellent weather and days off. For parents and students, the back-to-school period is often a potent cocktail of relief, excitement, and anxiety.

For many, September is a "temporal marker," a life transition when one era feels like it ends and another begins. A temporal marker is a potentially powerful springboard for change. Research shows that we tend to view these life shifts as a fresh start, a time when we have the freedom to become a new, better

version of ourselves. In short, temporal markers, including the ghost of the beginning of school years past, are a perfect time to unveil a whole new US (even if just to ourselves).

September also feels like a natural time 'to get cracking.' We can rely on that new school year feeling to get us started on new projects, we also need to have enough force to push us to its conclusion. We all must rely on other longer-term motivation strategies for that. As teachers, we mark the beginning of each school year as the start to new a cycle and approach the year with a spring in our steps and the enthusiasm to embrace all of the opportunities ahead.

For those of you reading this that are not part of Sisterhood, I urge you to consider joining. Opportunities to take advantage of being a member are boundless. Let me highlight a few.

TIKKUN OLAM (Healing the World)




