### **Love Your Enemies**

Our movie group recently watched a movie called "Sorry to Bother You", a film that highlights the modern day realities of violence, racism, and inequality. While the movie was not overwhelmingly enjoyed by people, the discussion around these difficult themes proved worthwhile- a heartbreaking reminder that these societal ills pervade our community and world, even in 2023.

A *midrash* about the destruction of the Second Temple in 70 CE by the Romans provides a rationale for this catastrophic event. The rabbis viewed the destruction as divine punishment because of our *sinat hinam*, our senseless hatred for one another, and tell the story of two characters, Kamtza

and Bar Kamtza. A man who was hosting a party told his servant to invite his friend, Kamtza, but not Bar Kamtza, whom he hated. Unfortunately, the servant confused the invitations. When the host's enemy arrived instead, the host proceeded to humiliate him. In retaliation, Bar Kamtza went to the Roman emperor and told him the Jews were rebelling. Because of this false report, and sinat hinam, the Romans destroyed Jerusalem and the Second Temple.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr turned the concept of *sinat hinam* on its head. In one of his most famous sermons, Loving Your Enemies, Dr. King preached: "Returning hate for hate multiplies hate, adding deeper darkness to a night already devoid of stars. Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that."

Later this month, over MLK weekend, we will gather with our dear friends at Zion Baptist Church and Beth Am Israel, revisiting the powerful words and deeds of Dr. King. We will sing songs and tell stories about the impact he had on so many people and the difference he made in the world; we will be inspired as we are every year.

As we face unprecedented levels of antisemitism, here at home and around the world, it is as important as ever to build bridges and be in a community with people who love and support us. Don't miss the opportunity to be a part of creating space for love for one another and for all peoples. We look forward to being with you at Beth Am Israel on Friday at 7:00 pm for Shabbat services and again on Saturday morning for two engaging opportunities at 9:00 am-Torah study and a musical program, Music of Freedom, and on Sunday at Zion Baptist Church at 10:30 am.

May 2023 be a year of light and love for all.

## Winter is Coming... Yay!

If you are like 9 out of 10 Americans, then we are now in your least favorite time of the year...winter. Don't worry, I am not about to tell you that I love winter, but I am going to give you six excellent reasons to embrace this cold and occasionally snowy season.

- 1. The days are getting longer: December 21 was the shortest day of the year which means that every day of winter has more daylight than the day before. From January 1 to February 28, we will gain over an hour of daylight!
- 2. Some allergies take a break: If, like me, you are one of the nearly 25 million Americans who suffer from spring allergies, then winter is the perfect time to enjoy some sneeze and itchy eye-free time outside.
- 3. Cold weather burns more calories: When it's cold, your body works harder to maintain your core temp. More work can equal more calories burned.
- 4. Less hair loss occurs in winter. In one University Hospital of Zurich study, researchers followed 823 women for six years and found that they lost the most hair in the summer and the least in the winter.
- 5. Lower risk of disease: Sure, you might be more likely to catch a cold in the winter, but you're in the clear for several diseases and viruses that are more prevalent in warmer temps. That's because pesky mosquitoes – like the ones that carry West Nile virus - hibernate during winter.
- 6. Enjoy better sleep: Your body's core temp naturally drops when you're trying to sleep; this process can take up to two hours in the heat of summer but is much faster in winter. Some new research suggests that you can burn more calories while you sleep if your keep your bedroom temp between 60-67 degrees – and you'll save energy too!

Researchers have also found that having something to look forward in January and February can dramatically improve your attitude towards winter. Before you start googling airfare to Tahiti, MLRT has you covered. Be sure to mark your calendar or register for one or all of these upcoming events:



### Jewish Disability Awareness, Acceptance, and Inclusion Month



Each February during Jewish Disability Awareness, Acceptance, and Inclusion Month, we honor those in our community with disabilities, those who care for children, parents, or others with disabilities, and disability rights advocates. This year, we will welcome author Arielle Silverman, PhD, whose book, Just Human: The Quest for Disability Wisdom, Respect, and Inclusion, tells the story of her life as a blind woman.

Arielle has spent a lifetime exploring ways to foster respect and inclusion, not only for blind people like her, but for all of us whose bodies or minds differ from the norm. In <u>Just Human</u>, she reflects on her formative years and presents unique anecdotes from her life that carry teachable moments for all of us. She recalls the feel of her mother's embrace, the smell of her grandparents' brisket, the inner sensations of a preteen crush, the music on her wedding day, and scholarly lessons from her dissertation research. Her words paint pictures from her mind's eye: a vision of a world where we can radically accept ourselves and our fellow humans, while at the same time work to change systems of inequality.

As she writes of the past and the present, Arielle looks toward the future, considering how we can build a more inclusive world for those who come after us (disabilitywisdom.com/just-human-book/). Arielle will speak at our Friday night service on February 10 at 6:30 pm. Join us!

**Tu B'Shevat** Tu B'Shevat or the "New Year of the Trees" is Jewish Arbor Day. The holiday is observed on the 15<sup>th</sup> (tu) of the Hebrew month of Shevat, this year falling out on February 5. Scholars believe that originally Tu B'Shevat was an agricultural festival, marking the emergence of spring. In the 17th century, Kabbalists created a ritual for Tu B'Shevat that is similar to a Passover Seder. Today, many Jews hold a modern version of the Tu B'Shevat Seder each year. The holiday also has become a tree-planting festival in Israel, in which Israelis and Jews around the world plant trees in honor or in memory of loved ones and friends.

While the holiday is not biblical in nature, it is mentioned by the rabbis in the Talmud, and plays an important role in the Jewish calendar. Many different customs have evolved over the centuries to honor this new year of the trees. Some examples include: planting a tree, eating a new fruit, or eating from the Seven Species (Shivat Haminim) described in the Torah as being abundant in the land of Israel. The Shivat Haminim are: wheat, barley, grapes (vines), figs, pomegranates, olives, and dates (honey).

This year, MLRT will hold a Tu B'Shevat Seder on February 5 at 5:00 pm. Enjoy a taste of the Seven Species as we celebrate this joyous harvest holiday together. This program is open to the entire MLRT community; see you there!

## **Lifelong Learning**



Our monthly reading of short stories followed by lively discussions in person and online will continue during the upcoming winter months. Our technology enables those sitting around the Temple's table and those at home to interact.

In January, we will read "The Poets in the Kitchen Window" by Ayelet Tsabari, a favorite author of mine who writes about the Mizrachi Jews' experience in her stories. A young boy living in Tel Aviv during the Gulf War discusses poetry, religion, and politics with his newly arrived sister. The stories Ms. Tsabari writes give a multi-faceted insight into life in Israel. We have read other stories by the author, taken from her award-winning collection, The Best Place on Earth. Join us on Thursday, January 12,2023 in person or online as we discuss the story.

Our February story (note it will be the third Thursday in February) is titled "Shaare Emunah" by Steven Volynetz. He is an author who is new to us. He was born in Ukraine and grew up in Brooklyn. The story was featured in Paper Brigade, the literary magazine of the Jewish Book Council. "Shaare Emunah" won the Moment Magazine-Karma Foundation prize for fiction prize. Join me on Thursday, February 16 as we discuss this complex story about a Russian-Jewish man living in New York as a trader on Wall Street.

Friday evening, February 10, 2023 will be Inclusion Shabbat when MLRT and the Inclusion committee will host Arielle Silverman. She will talk about her book Just Human: The Quest for Disability Wisdom, Respect, and Inclusion. Just Human tells the story of a blind Jewish woman's journey toward building inclusion for all. Born without sight, Dr. Arielle Silverman has spent a lifetime exploring ways to foster respect and inclusion for all of us whose bodies or minds differ from the norm. Her memoir will be available for signing.

Tuesday, February 21 will be our annual Sisterhood Author Brunch. This year, our author will be Gioia Diliberto whose book, Coco at the Ritz, will generate discussion about the choices made during World War II. The famous designer was charged with treason stemming from her romance with a Nazi spy. After listening to Ms. Diliberto's presentation, you will want to read this absorbing and timely book, if you haven't already! At every Jewish moment, there has been a book, an author, and a community of readers to help us to understand the world in which we live. Let us continue our fine tradition here at Main Line Reform Temple.

On Saturday evening, February 4, Sisterhood and Brotherhood are hosting a joint cabaret event called "Jewish Caroling: The Music of Carole King, Carole Bayer Sager and Carolyn Leigh."

Performed by Deborah Zecher and a piano accompanist, the program includes songs of these three iconic songwriters as well as stories about their lives. Carole King is probably the most well-known of the three with Tapestry having celebrated its 50th anniversary recently. Carole Bayer Sager has collaborated with so many composers and her relationship with Marvin Hamlisch was immortalized in They're Playing our Song. Carolyn Leigh wrote such well-known standards as "Young At Heart", "Witchcraft" and much of the music of Peter Pan. Registration details will be available soon - check your inbox!

### Israel Matters

My husband and I just returned from our 10th trip to Israel. In the past, we spent most of our time in Jerusalem, Tel Aviv and points north like the Galil and Haifa. This time, I wanted to head south and really explore the Negev which makes up 60% of Israel's land but has less than 15% of her population. After spending the first three nights in Jerusalem (still my favorite and most beautiful city in Israel), we began our journey south, stopping first at Bet Guvrin-Maresha National Park, known for its numerous and fascinatingly beautiful caves dug by its ancient inhabitants. After a quick stop in Beersheva for lunch, we arrived at Mitzpe Ramon, the home of the Ramon Crater (Makhtesh) Nature Reserve where we stayed for two nights. Makhtesh is the Hebrew word for a mortar grinder. The 40x9 km crater shaped like an elongated heart was given this name because of its similarity to a grinding bowl. Unique to Israel's Negev and Egypt's Sinai deserts', a makhtesh is not created by the impact of a meteor or volcanic activity; it is a large erosion cirque created 220 million years ago when oceans covered the area. We took a guided jeep tour of the crater where we observed first hand its unique environment including plants, rock formations, landscapes, and the lbex who leisurely roam the area. ### Teach Our Children: ECE



ECE Director

Main Line Reform Temple School for Early Childhood Education practitioners understands that an excellent early childhood experience offers an unrivaled opportunity to engage families with young Jewish children and deepen their Jewish connection.

During the first four months of school, educators at MLRT ECE worked on defining the school's current approach to educational excellence and Jewish

engagement. That draws its power from the unique blend of a world-renowned early childhood model that celebrates each child and values individuality and uniqueness in each student and the integration of Jewish ideas and values in daily activities.

As we moved through that process, we defined our ideology based on the belief that children deserve early childhood experiences that develop their multi-faceted potential and increase their love of learning. Mutual respect between teachers, children, and families is the hallmark to our approach. Teachers build on children's perceptual and cognitive powers to provide customized learning experiences that enable children to probe deeply into areas that interest them. The children's projects are carefully documented. The documentation uses images and words to record the student's thinking, understanding, and learning processes and is a valuable tool for reflection and dialogue.

Our family engagement approach is reflected in how families are welcomed in the morning to communication about each child to make parents partners in the educational enterprise.

Through study and discussion of the MLRT ECE values, teachers and parents develop a shared vision and deep understanding of Judaism. Of course, there is much room for interpretation, but below is a sample of the lenses we use each day:

- Masa: Journey (Reflection, Return, and Renewal): Families come together to begin a continual journey that implies both struggle and promise. We make time for moments of celebration, regularly gathering for Shabbat, holidays, and other important moments.
- B'rit: Covenant (Belonging and Commitment): The families and staff of MLRT ECE entered a "covenant" of mutual support with clearly defined but evolving obligations and roles.
- Tzelem Elokim: Divine Image (Dignity and Potential): The school community honors everyone's uniqueness and diversity.
- K'dushah: Holiness (Intentionality and Presence): Families come together to appreciate the blessing of having a community.
- Hit'orerut: Awakening (Amazement and Gratitude): This builds on children's joy of discovery, their sense of amazement, and wonder as a source of energy.
- D'rash: Interpretation (Inquiry, Dialogue, and Transmission): By studying together and through joint inquiry and dialogue, our community bonds and grows.
- Tikkun Olam: Repair of the World (Responsibility): This lens emphasizes the school communities' responsibility to the world around us.

We hope that through the second half of the school year, we hone into those lenses to celebrate each child's identity and promote the school's approach as the primary vector to create a space for excellence for our community.


