At the end of January, the Bernie Kleinman Book Club met to discuss Who By Fire: Leonard Cohen in the Sinai by Matti Friedman. It was a fascinating glimpse into Cohen's history, both personal and professional, and a poignant account of the stories from the front line during the Yom Kippur War in 1973.

Toward the beginning of the book, when Friedman provides background on Cohen's family tree and his formative years, he quotes the artist, "We cannot face the heaven. We have lost our genius for the vertical. Jewish novelists are sociologists. Horizonalists. And the residue of energy left from that great vertical seizure we had four thousand years ago- that we turn toward ourselves."

What an incredible perspective and turn of phrase! I think Cohen points to something important, that our ancestors acted in a radical way to connect to the divine. Looking horizontally is problematic only when it's selfish. So really our lives as Jews should be vertical and horizontal-connecting to both the divine and community.

As we look to the spring, we are well positioned to do just that. In just a few short weeks on Monday, March 6, we celebrate Purim, and while God is not mentioned in the story of Purim at all, we are reminded of Esther and Mordechai's heroics to save the Jewish community from the nefarious Haman. (It's worth mentioning that our shpiel this year is "The Princess Bride!") On the heels of Purim we celebrate Pesach, our people's liberation from slavery in Egypt and God's role in that deliverance; we will bring together the vertical and horizontal at our Second Night Seder on Thursday, April 6.

But maybe most importantly, we are a bustling, busy community with so much to offer. Please take a moment and explore the many happenings at Main Line Reform Temple; we can't wait to see you here for whatever inspires you- the vertical: Shabbat, Torah and Bible study (of several varieties), Shabbat morning walk, and holiday observances, as well as the horizontal: bridge, book club, movie club, Sisterhood, Brotherhood. We look forward to being with you every step of the way!

HOW LAWYERS TALK ABOUT HATE AND DISCRIMINATION: ETHICAL **DUTIES VS. FIRST AMENDMENT RIGHT TO FREE SPEECH - CLE PROGRAM** Presented by MLRT and Gratz College

Sunday, March 26, 2023, 9:30 -11:30 am at MLRT with Judge Greg Buzzard

Greg Buzzard is an administrative appellate Judge for the Benefits Review Board, a five-member judicial body charged with adjudicating appeals nationwide in litigation involving black lung disease in coal miners, occupational injuries and illnesses in the shipping and maritime industries, and war injuries sustained by military contractors. Appointed to this position by the Secretary of Labor in 2014, he issues decisions in approximately two hundred cases per year involving constitutional challenges, statutory and regulatory interpretation, evidentiary rulings, and factual disputes. Judge Buzzard also serves as an Adjunct Professor of legal ethics at Georgetown University Law Center, where he helps the next generation of lawyers explore the ethical, moral, and

social issues lawyers face in the practice of law.

Prior to these roles, Judge Buzzard was General Counsel to U.S. Senator John D. Rockefeller IV, serving as the Senator's chief counsel on a broad range of legal and legislative matters, including government ethics, constitutional interpretation, federal and state justice systems, campaign finance, labor and employment law, immigration, and civil rights. In 2019, he was named a Fellow of the American Bar Foundation for outstanding dedication to the highest principles of the legal profession and the welfare of his community. He holds a J.D. from the West Virginia University College of Law and an LL.M. in International Business and Economic Law from Georgetown. Judge Buzzard resides in Wynnewood with his wife, Rachel, and children, Luke and Emma. They are members of Main Line Reform Temple and his children are students at the MLRT School for Early Childhood Education.

JEWISH BOOK COUNCIL

As spring approaches, I hope all of our readers have stayed safe and healthy. In the coming weeks, our short story group will continue with its stimulating discussions.

On March 9, we will discuss "The Cost of Something Priceless" by Elizabeth Zelvin from an anthology, <u>Jewish Noir II: Tales of Crime & Other Dark Deeds</u>. The author is an award-winning poet, a psychotherapist, and a singer-songwriter. Join us as we explore "The Cost."

April brings us a tale from one of our master story-tellers, Bernard Malamud's "The Magic Barrel". This story tells us of a rabbinical student who uses a marriage broker to find a wife. We hope to see you in person or via Zoom for this April 13 discussion.

In the coming months, we will host two authors. MLRT's Brotherhood will welcome Josh Weiss, a Philadelphia author who wrote Beat the Devils. This book explores time travel in an inventive crime thriller.

Mr. Weiss is fascinated by the intersection of popular culture and Judaism. Brotherhood will participate in this annual service on Friday, March 24 at 8:00 pm.

April brings our annual community-wide Yom HaShoah service. As part of this inspiring event on April 17, Isabel Vincent will discuss her book, Overture of Hope: Two Sisters' Daring Plan That Saved Opera's Jewish Stars from the Third Reich. Ms. Vincent won the Yad Vashem award for Holocaust History and a National Jewish Book Award for her books in addition to the honors she's accumulated as an investigative reporter. Please take note of three books of current interest that I have added to the library:

- Who By Fire: Leonard Cohen in the Sinai, by Matti Friedman, a journalist who gives a riveting account of Leonard Cohen's 1973 tour of Israel during the Yom Kippur War. This book is the current choice of One Book One Jewish Community at Gratz College and is referenced in Rabbi Newburge's article in this very bulletin!
- John Boyne's book, All the Broken Places, about an older German woman who confronts the sins of her past. This a very well nuanced novel I hope you will take the time to read.
- Squirrel Hill: The Tree of Life Synagogue Shooting and the Soul of a Neighborhood a poignant, deeply researched account of the Pittsburgh Jewish neighborhood in the aftermath of tragedy, by Mark Oppenheimer.

Let's continue our tradition of reading and learning here at Main Line Reform Temple through the spring!

Israel Matters

As promised in last month's Israel Matters, I'm going to finish my southern tour of Israel. We left off in Mitzpe Ramon where we spent two nights by the Ramon Crater Nature Preserve (Makhtesh). From there we headed south to Avdat National Park. Avdat was part of the old Incense Spice Route that extended from the Arabian Peninusla to the Port of Gaza for approximately 600 years (from the Greeks to the late Roman period). Because the incense trade was so profitable, many small towns development along the way to service the traders and camel caravans. Avdat, settled by the Nabateans, was abandoned when a huge earthquake struck the area. Its ruins were only uncovered in 1958 under the auspices of Hebrew University. In 2005, it was declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site. It is well worth a stop to see the Roman Tower, the Citadel, churches, Roman bathhouses and much more.

From Avadat, it is only a two hour drive south to Eilat, a fun, diverse city located on the Red Sea and surrounded by the legendary Red Mountains. With its warm temperatures, it is easy to understand why it is a top tourist attraction. You can swim with the dolphins, snorkel and scuba by a healthy coral reef, explore the Underwater Observatory Park, spend a day at the beach or take a boat ride. It was amazing to be able to view a bit of Egypt, Jordan and the Arabian peninsula all from our little boat.

Since the Jordanian border is only fifteen minutes from Eilat, many tourists take a side trip to Petra, a 5th century UNESCO World Heritage Site with intricate tombs, temples, and a large Treasury carved into the pink rock of the Jordanian mountains. It also is where the Nabatean spice trade began. At our southern journey's end, we had an easy 45 minute flight from Eilat to Ben Gurion Airport in Tel Aviv. I hope I have tempted you to give the desert a try.


PURIM PIZZA PARTY - FRIDAY, MARCH 3 AT 6:00 PM

PESACH

What is Pesach (Passover)?

Pesach, or in English, Passover, is many things. It is a Festival of Freedom, when we recall how God released our ancestors from slavery in Egypt and assisted in bringing a free people into existence.

Pesach is an Agricultural Festival, which in ancient times marked the beginning of the grain harvest. In those days, our ancestors were farmers tilling the soil for a livelihood. The story of Passover reminds us of the Land of Israel.

Pesach is a Pilgrimage Festival. Three times during the year, the Israelites, according to the laws of the Torah, went in joyous procession to Jerusalem. There they celebrated the three festivals that occur during the year: Pesach, Shavuot, and Sukkot.

Pesach is all of these things, but it is especially a holiday for children-a tradition to pass on from generation to generation - L'dor V'dor... Our ancestors were instructed: "You shall tell it to your (son) child." Today, Jews around the world still follow the tradition of retelling the story of Pesach. We recount the story of the Jews in the land of Egypt and the trials and tribulations that our ancestors endured. We teach our children to value freedom, never taking it for granted and fighting for those who are still not free.

As the sun sets on Wednesday, April 5, Jews throughout the world will begin the celebration of Pesach. They will gather at the Seder table and retell the story of Passover, the Jewish struggle for freedom from oppression.

Traditionally, Judaism views the Seder as both a meal and as teaching opportunity. While the Haggadah teaches us the story of Pesach, we each have stories to share with each other. And, it is the most memorable of holidays for our children as we gather round the beautiful holiday table to retell the story of Exodus, enjoy these special foods, search for the afikomen, welcome Elijah and join together in the singing of ancient melodies.

2ND NIGHT PESACH SEDER - Thursday, April 6 at 5:30 pm

Second Night Seder is back! Rabbi Newburge and Cantor Rudnick are delighted to bring back this wonderful community event and lead a participatory seder that will keep people of all ages engaged and celebrating our freedom from slavery. The dinner will be catered and we ask that each family bring a Pesach dessert to share with others.

The following symbolic foods should be placed near the leader of the Seder. During the course of the Seder, they are pointed out and explained. On the Seder plate (use either a special one for this purpose or a regular dinner plate), include:

- Shank bone-z'roah, symbolizes the lamb that was sacrificed in ancient days
- Roasted egg-beitzah, represents the Pesach sacrificial offering of ancient days as well as the wholeness and continuing cycle of life
- Bitter herbs-maror (horseradish or romaine lettuce), reminds us of the bitter lives of the Hebrew slaves
- Charoset (the mixture of apples, nuts, sweet wine, cinnamon and sugar in the Ashkenazic fashion or dates, nuts and sweet wine in the Sephardic tradition), reminds us of the bricks and mortar made by the Hebrew slaves
- Greens-karpas, symbolizes the springtime of the year when Pesach takes place

Elijah's Cup – A special cup filled with wine. According to legend, Elijah visits every Seder in every home on Pesach and drinks from his cup.

Miriam's Cup – A cup filled with water to honor the role of Miriam the Prophetess in the Exodus and to highlight the contributions of women to Jewish culture, past and present.

Haggadah – The book containing the order of the Seder.

Candles – Pesach is one of the three Pilgrimage Festivals when candles are lit and blessed just as they are on Shabbat.

Matzah – The unleavened bread of affliction that our ancestors ate as they left Egypt.

Salt Water - Symbolic of the tears our ancestors shed in Egypt.

Every year at Passover, we affirm our obligation to care for one another by proclaiming "Let all who are hungry come and eat." Two ways to help, both locally and globally, are below.

Once again, the Jewish community will come together to gather Chametz for the Hungry before Passover. Chametz will be collected from March 20- 31 at MLRT and then distributed to local shelters and food pantries helping the hungry and the homeless.

Only fresh, unopened, unexpired items will be accepted.

Each year at the Seder, we ask the traditional four questions. And each year, MAZON, a Jewish nonprofit organization dedicated to preventing and alleviating hunger among people of all faiths and backgrounds, asks a Fifth Question to raise awareness about a particular hunger-related issue and spark important conversations around the Seder table. This year, join us in asking: How will we retell the story of this past year, and all it has wrought?

Yom HaShoah

Members of the Kehillah of Lower Merion will join together at MLRT for our annual communal observance of Yom HaShoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day, on Monday, April 17, at 7:00 pm.

Our commemoration will feature the lighting of the six-branched candelabrum by Holocaust survivors and the family members of survivors, in memory of the six million Jews who were murdered in the Holocaust.

The service will include liturgy and music led by the clergy and combined choirs from the Kehillah of Lower Merion, as well as a thoughtful and moving presentation by author Isabel Vincent.

Isabel Vincent is an investigative reporter who has broken stories on Chinese police operations in New York City and Black Lives Matter's financial dealings. A graduate of the University of Toronto, she is also the author of seven non-fiction books and began her career at Canada's Globe and Mail. Among her first assignments was covering the last days of drug kingpin Pablo Escobar in Medellin when she was Latin America Bureau Chief. Serving as a foreign correspondent, she covered conflicts in Kosovo for the Globe and Mail, and the war in Angola for the Nationa Post and the Globe and Mail. Since 2008 she has been an investigative reporter for New York Post, covering New York City and corruption.

In 2021, Vincent published <u>Two Against Hitler: The True Story of Two Courageous Sisters, a Rescue Mission in the Third Reich, and Opera</u>, about the Cook sisters, Ida and Louise, the latter better known as romance writer Mary Burchell, who helped Jews escape Nazi-era Germany, with the possible covert assistance of the British government.

We Remember! This is a sacred and sanctified observance. It is our one opportunity to bear witness to history, and to give testimony that we will never forget that Holocaust, and those that may threaten yet again.

Please be with us in solidarity and in community. The entire community, both Jewish and non-Jewish, is invited to join us and school-aged children are encouraged to attend.

Yom HaZikaron and Yom Ha'Atzmaut

Since the establishment of the State of Israel in 1948, four new holidays have been added to the Jewish calendar – Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day), Yom HaZikaron (Memorial Day), Yom HaAtzmaut (Independence Day), and Yom Y'rushalayim (Jerusalem Day, which celebrates the reunification of the city in 1967).

The Israeli Knesset (parliament) established the day that precedes Yom Ha'Atzmaut as Yom HaZikaron, a day to memorialize soldiers who lost their lives fighting in the War of Independence and subsequent battles, as well as a day to remember civilian victims of terrorism.

Teach Our Children: ECE

Celebrating Passover with a Seder is a time-honored tradition. At MLRT ECE, we just hosted a custom that is currently enjoying a revival among Jewish communities - the creation and celebration of a Tu B'Shevat Seder.

This ritual was developed in the 16th century by the Kabbalists (Jewish Mystics) in Safed in Northern Israel. Unlike the Passover Haggadah, the liturgy for Tu B'Shevat is less developed

and codified; there is significant space to get creative for this festive celebration.

As with the Passover Seder, the Tu B'Shevat Seder is highlighted by drinking four cups of wine, with a difference: each cup represents a different season. The first cup is traditionally white wine representing winter, the second white with a few drops of red for spring, the third a mix of red and white for summer, and the fourth primarily red for fall.

This year, our focus was less on the different colors of the grape juice that would mark each season and more on highlighting the importance of and the meaning of eating four groups of fruits at various points during the Seder. The older children spent days talking about the Seven Species – Shivat HaMinim- two grains and five fruits – which are listed in the Torah as unique products of the land of Israel. While the wheat crackers and the grapes were not a novelty for almost all children, tasting the figs, dates, and pomegranates was a new experience for many of our young friends.

We introduced each type of fruit as it related to a different realm or rung of existence — physical, emotional, intellectual, and spiritual. You may think that this was too intense and even less realistic to do with our audience, however, the high level of participation among our young friends transformed our Seder from ordinary to extraordinary and memorable.

As we now approach the Passover Seder, we hang on to some meaningful ways to replicate some of the memorable Tu B'Shevat Seder moments in this upcoming school-wide Seder celebration. Sure, the purpose of a seder might be "to celebrate Passover." Still, we wondered if you could go a bit deeper and find something even more specific that will impact the growth of our young audience in their spiritual and educational journey. For example, maybe the Passover Seder will re-enact an important Jewish story by connecting it to themes of struggle that remain relevant today or express our love for friends and family by preparing distinctive foods that contain powerful symbolism.

The avenue we will take to shape our school-wide upcoming Passover Seder will be another meaningful gathering in which we want to remain truthful to our children and families. We will participate in another authentic Seder experience that will honor the joint health and well-being of all our community members.

In whichever format your family and yourself choose to participate through or plan for the Passover Seder, remember that the key to that whole experience is to express thanks and gratitude and create opportunities to reflect and make meaning of the Seder.


