Shimon Peres, Prime Minister and President of Israel, said, "I have earned the title of expert, it is only on what was. There is no expert on what will be. And yet, without knowing the future, I remain a man full of hope."

Peres embodied this idea- learning from the past and working hard to ensure a better future. He immigrated with his family from Belarus to Palestine when he was eleven, and fought for Israel's independence, serving the nascent country in many capacities over decades. As the country faced challenges and opportunities, he always seemed to find a way forward, to make the situation better for his people and for the world, perhaps that stemmed from his abiding sense of hope.

We very much look forward to sharing the oys and joys of life with you (hopefully more of the latter for everyone) not only at the High Holy Days, but throughout the year. Your presence and participation is always appreciated and celebrated. Would you like an honor at Shabbat or festival services to celebrate a special birthday or anniversary or to commemorate the yahrzeit of a loved one? What interests you at the congregation that you would like to be more involved with in the coming year?

With high hopes for the new year, I share with you a prayer composed by my colleague Rabbi John L. Rosove which I hope will be inspirational and aspirational.

May we hold lovingly in our thoughts those who suffer from tyranny, subjection, cruelty, and injustice, and work every day toward the alleviation of their suffering. May we recognize our solidarity with the stranger, outcast, downtrodden, abused, and deprived, that no human being be treated as "other," that our common humanity weaves us together in one fabric of mutuality, one garment of destiny. May we pursue the Biblical prophet's vision of peace, that we might live harmoniously with each other and side by side, respecting differences, cherishing diversity, with no one exploiting the weak, each living without fear of the other, each revering Divinity in every human soul. May we struggle against institutional injustice, free those from oppression and contempt, act with purity of heart and mind, despising none, defrauding none, hating none, cherishing all, honoring every child of God, every creature of the earth. May the Jewish people, the state of Israel, and all peoples know peace in this New Year, and may we nurture kindness and love everywhere.

May 5784 bring you and yours good health, abundant joy, never-ending love, and an abiding sense of peace.

Two-In-One Celebration of Torah

This was a particularly challenging bulletin article to write. Not because I couldn't think of what I wanted to write about, but because I had too much that I wanted to write about. Should I write about something Israel related? Should I write about American politics? Climate change after this excruciatingly hot summer? My process for getting ready for the holidays? Something liturgical or text based or spiritual? My list went on and on. And though I could write endlessly about any of those, it also occurred to me that my favorite Jewish holiday, Simchat Torah, comes right after the heavy hitters of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, and that it would be a perfect topic for a bulletin article.

The Torah teaches us that a day called Shemini Atzeret occurs at the end of Sukkot. The purpose of this day remains unclear, but seems to have been a day for ritual cleansing of the altar in the

Temple. Shemini Atzeret begins the cycle in which we pray for rain, changing the one line in the Gevurot from morid hatal (You rain dew upon us) to mashiv haruach u'morid hagashem (You cause the wind to shift and rain to fall.) Simchat Torah, which most likely originated in the medieval period, celebrates the conclusion of one cycle and the beginning of another. In modern times and in liberal communities, the celebration of Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah has become one. Both mark the passage of time and, more specifically, the changing of religious and calendar cycles, making it easy to combine the two into one fabulous celebration of Torah and our people.

As a kid, my family would go to Simchat Torah at our small Conservative congregation, where we would dance, do seven hakafot only stopping when the giant stop light turned red, hear the Torah chanted, receive Hershey bars, and turn back to the beginning of the Torah to start it all over again. Since my ordination, I have dreamed of recreating a Simchat Torah similar to what lives in my memory, something that creates memories for the congregation and is truly festive

This year, Simchat Torah is on Friday night, October 6. Since it coincides with Shabbat, we are going to going to do it up right. There will be food trucks, live music, a camp-style Shabbat Service, Torah chanting, more food and music, a display of our beautiful Illustrated Torah, and did I mention food and music? All MLRT family and friends are welcome to enjoy our Simchat Torah celebration is open to all and good for all ages and stages. Mark your calendars now, bring a few friends, and get ready to have a special Simchat Torah experience.

Wishing everyone a sweet and healthy 5784. May you all be inscribed for goodness in the year to come.



Sukkot and Shemini Atzeret/Simchat Torah

Sukkot, a Hebrew word meaning "booths" or "huts," refers to the annual Jewish festival of giving thanks for a bountiful fall harvest and commemorates the 40 years of Jewish wandering in the desert after the giving of the Torah at Mt. Sinai. Sukkot is marked by several distinct traditions, including erecting and dwelling in a sukkah (a temporary booth or hut). Sukkot (pl.) are commonly used during the seven-day festival for eating, entertaining and even for sleeping.

Sukkot, also called Z'man Simchateinu (Season of Our Rejoicing), is the only festival with an explicit commandment to rejoice. A final name for Sukkot is Chag HaAsif, (Festival of the Ingathering), a time to give thanks for the bounty of the earth during the fall harvest. The eighth day of Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret, is traditionally a separate festival in its own right. In Reform congregations, which generally observe one day of holidays rather than two, Shemini Atzeret is observed concurrently with Simchat Torah, the festival of "rejoicing in the Torah."

We have a <u>very</u> limited number of sukkot available to lend out, and for the very first time, they come with a lulav and etrog of your own! Please contact Rabbi Kevin Kleinman at kkleinman@mlrt.org to request one before September 13 or while supplies last.

Don't have a lulav and etrog and still want to perform the mitzvah of shaking? We are offering you two opportunities to shake it up in our MLRT Sukkah: before services on Erev Sukkot, Friday, September 29 at 6:00 pm (weather permitting) or after our Festival/Shabbat Service on Saturday, September 30.




