## My Heart is in the East

My heart is in the East, and I am at the edge of the West.

Then how can I taste what I eat, how can I enjoy it?

How can I fulfill my vows and pledges, while Zion is in the domain of Edom, and I am in the bonds of Arabia?

It would be easy for me to leave behind all the good things of Spain; it would be glorious to see the dust of the ruined Sanctuary.

This famous medieval poem, Lee-bee V'mizrach- My Heart is in the East, was written by Judah Halevi, the renowned rabbi, poet and philosopher who lived most of his life in Muslim Spain in the 12th century. After penning these words he actually left "behind all the good things of Spain," and attempted to make

the pilgrimage to Jerusalem. He made it as far as the port of Alexandria in Egypt, where he died 6 months after he arrived.

As I sit down to write this, Israel continues to be under siege and the war is entering its third month. The power and need to be part of the Jewish community, to feel connected to our brothers and sisters in Israel, remains unabated.

Sadly, the hideous rise of antisemitism, or as many are now calling it, Jewish hate, is pervasive. Students at local colleges, as well as our MLRT students on many campuses, are living in a hostile environment and there is tremendous pressure to take actions against the Jewish community and Israel. This has taken many forms, and includes (but is not limited to) peer pressure to sign student petitions demanding the college administration essentially engage in BDS (boycott, divest and sanction Israel), made to feel physically and emotionally compromised from "die ins" or hateful posters or slogans being posted around campus, or having their mezuzah ripped off their doorposts.

We recently ran a program with the ADL and two of our incredible members who are LCSWs to offer perspective and support for dealing with these difficult realities. There are no easy answers for our students, or for any of us.

It is difficult to know what the next few months will bring, though I suspect it will be more of what we've been experiencing. Ronald Lauder (of the Estée Lauder family) said "The imperative to nurture a strong, unified Jewish community grows exponentially in the face of the dangers surrounding us. Now is the hour for unity and harmony, for a renaissance of Jewish solidarity." Being together brings comfort today, and God willing, brings a stronger, more vibrant community tomorrow.

So, just come. Come be with us for Shabbat, for an adult education session, for our annual day of service on MLK Day (January 15), for our Tu B'Shevat seder (January 26); join our amazing Sisterhood and Brotherhood; sign up for a committee (Israel, Religious Practices, Religious School, Tu B'shvat seder, Second Seder and more!).

My heart is in the East, with our brothers and sisters in Israel, but it is also very much here in Wynnewood, with our amazing congregation and together we are better and stronger. Let's not forget how fortunate we are to have each other and the blessings of our community.

Like many of you, I am a voracious reader. While I was in Cantorial School, though there was no end to the amount we had to read for classes, I made sure to read books for pleasure regularly. I had been introduced to the books of Greg Iles, an American author born and raised in Mississippi, through his historical fiction novels about the Holocaust. The professional bass hired each year for the High Holy Days at my student pulpit, was also a fan of Greg Iles and, while riding the train together back from Long Island to Manhattan, we discovered our shared interest. The bass, also named Greg, introduced me to Iles's Penn Cage series, which oscillates between modern day and the 1960's, or to be more accurate, the fight for civil rights in America.

We, in this community, are blessed by the relationship we have with our neighbors and friends at Zion Baptist Church. The work we do throughout the year, that is brought to the forefront each

year at our annual Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. weekend commemoration, is impactful and important work. Though the Civil Rights Era may be in the past, the work is not nearly done. Pirkei Avot 2:20-21 reminds us: "it is not your duty to complete the work, but neither are you free to desist from it." The work is ongoing; there is always a need but also always a path towards making the world a better place.

This MLK weekend, consider all the ways you can get involved. One of those ways is through music. I know I sound like a broken record (pun definitely intended), but music is an incredible tool. Music is a bridge, a connector, a healer, and the universal language. There is nothing quite as energizing, as truly electrifying, as joining together with the members of the Unity Choir in song on Friday night and Sunday morning. ## Israel Matters

In the aftermath of the devastating losses of October 7th in Israel, many stories of heroism have begun to emerge. I want to focus here on three "unlikely" heroes who demonstrate forcefully how much the fates of Israeli Jews and Israeli Arabs are intertwined – in the most beautiful way. First is a young Jewish woman, Shir Nosatzki, the founder of a non-profit organization called "Have You Seen the Horizon Lately?", devoted to promoting political partnerships between Arabs and Jews. Her organization quickly organized a Jewish-Arab emergency relief center in Rahat, Israel's largest Bedouin City. They are providing food and medical assistance to over 500 families in the South – both Bedouin and Jewish. Shir and her husband, Regev Contes, have produced viral videos highlighting amazing stories of Israeli Arab heroism. One is the story of Hissam Alkrenawi, who worked in the cafeteria at Kibbutz Be'eri. When he saw one of the Jewish kibbutz members, Aya Meydan, trying to return to the kibbutz from an early morning bike ride, he warned her and literally hid with her in the bushes, then called his uncle and cousins at his home in Rahat, who rescued her when they arrived a couple of hours later. On the way, Hissam's family members took time to rescue over 30 people who were fleeing from the Nova Music Festival. As Hissam's family was loading Aya and Hissam into their truck, they were confronted by IDF soldiers finally arriving, who thought they were kidnapping Maya! Visit bit.ly/46UScoB to see more.

Another story that Shir tells is the story of Hamid Ar'ar, an Arab man from the Bedouin town of Arara. He was driving with his wife (a Muslim Israeli and mother of 9 dressed in a hijab) when they were surrounded by Hamas terrorists, and she was shot dead. Hamid immediately grabbed their baby boy and escaped on foot, hiding in a roadside shed. Later that day he heard Israeli soldiers approaching, and then heard Hamas members hiding behind the shed, and realized the Israelis were walking into an ambush. He leapt out with his son, at mortal danger to the two of them, to warn the Israeli soldiers of the danger to them. Visit bit.ly/3Tjj6Uato see more.

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## Be a Champion of Action

Philadelphia is the home of many well-known firsts - first public library, first zoo, first hospital, first Girl Scout Cookies and first computer. Did you know that Philadelphia is also the home the first Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service?

The idea for an MLK Day of Service evolved from a discussion in 1988 between Pennsylvania U.S. Senator Harris Wofford (who was then Director of the PA Department of Labor and Industry) and Todd Bernstein (who as an aid to Wofford and now heads Global Citizen 365 in Philadelphia). As a Senator, Wofford co-authored the federal King Holiday and Service Act with Atlanta Congressman John Lewis. Wofford and Lewis were both close friends and colleagues of Dr. King and the goal of the legislation was to challenge Americans to transform the MLK Day holiday into a day of citizen action and volunteer service in honor of Dr. King. President Bill Clinton signed the King Holiday and Service

Act into law on August 23, 1994.

The national MLK Day of Service started in Philadelphia in 1996 as a small project with 1,000 volunteers. Nearly 2 million Philadelphians have participated in MLK Day of Service projects and Philadelphia has always been and continues to be the proud home of the largest MLK Day of Service in the country.

Todd Bernstein once told the Jewish Exponent, "Dr. King was an enemy of apathy and a champion of action 365 days of the year. It's really not good enough to just get out one day and expect to really create fundamental change. That has to be an ongoing commitment throughout the year."

As we get ready to turn the calendar to 2024, now is the perfect time to ask yourself how you will be a "champion of action" in the coming year?

- Will you join a committee like Israel, Finance, Tikkun Olam, Philanthropy, Adult Education at MLRT?
- How about committing to driving a congregant to the doctor two times in 2024?
- Did you mark your calendar for the MLK Day of Service on January 15?
- Have you checked out upcoming volunteer activities planned by MLRT's Tikkun Olam Network?
- How about checking out the items needed by HIAS PA, Cradles to Crayons or the Mitzvah Circle and donating items from your home?

#### Tu B'Shevat

Jewish mystics visualize God as a tree, with roots in creation and branches spreading far and wide. As a way to incorporate this vision into their lives, the Kabbalists created a seder for Tu B'Shevat as a "tikkun" — a ritual of repair for the world, and we know our world is certainly in need of repair.

"A person is a tree of the field..." (Deuteronomy 20:19). How is a person a tree? Essentially, in Jewish tradition, a person is like a tree because we bear fruit- our teachings and our good deeds.

The rabbis remind us of this every year when we celebrate the Tu B'Shevat, the new year for trees. Interestingly, the Torah never mentions this holiday, and it is first noted in the Babylonian Talmud in connection with Rosh Hashanah and two other new years (Rosh Hashanah is the new year for the counting of years, Elul is the new year for the tithing of cattle and Nisan is the new year for kings and festivals).

At the seder, we reflect on seven species of produce and their relationship with the land of Israel first mentioned in the Torah in Deuteronomy (8:8), which describes Israel as 'a land of wheat, and barley, and vines; of fig trees and pomegranates; a land of olive oil and honey.' In Hebrew, they are known collectively as Shivat HaMinim ('seven species'). Please mark your calendars for Friday, January 26 at 6:30 pm when we will hold a special Shabbat service and Tu B'Shevat Seder, providing us with a unique and delicious learning opportunity.

I hope everyone had an enjoyable Thanksgiving and holiday season. Thanksgiving is a time when I mindfully look for gratitude in my life, however it was challenging to feel gratitude this past Thanksgiving due to my sorrow for the suffering in Israel and Gaza, and the resulting wave of antisemitism.

I feel I stand up to antisemitism by actively practicing Judaism (and supporting our Temple). One of my favorite aspects of Judaism is the idea of repairing the world through acts of kindness. There are many ways to do such, but since I am Sisterhood President, I will talk about Sisterhood actions. Sisterhood has always offered opportunities to help others.

One example is our long association with Mitzvah Circle Foundation, which is an organization supplying goods and services to families facing poverty, homelessness, illness, and a myriad of difficult

circumstances. Mitzvah Circle forges relationships with those in need and delivers and distributes care packages containing clothing, shoes, diapers, feminine hygiene products, toiletries, books, household goods and more.

A thoughtful way to support the MLRT community is to take part in Sisterhood's Shalach Manot. Shalach Manot are gifts of food or drink given on Purim to family, friends, and others (considered an act of kindness). Purim starts the evening of March 23rd – the deadline for Shalach Manot ordering is a few weeks prior which will be explained in an email sent to all congregants. It is always gratifying to give and receive Purim gifts. Another way to take part is to help pack Shalach Manot bags on March 15. Also, Sisterhood always needs help delivering the bags.

### Teach Our Children: Early Childhood Education



#### Birth - A Time of Opportunity for the Jewish Community

Exciting Initiative in our ECE MLRT –
Brand-New Infant Program starting September 2024

There are a few times in life when the conventional routine shifts radically. An old way of life ends, and a new one begins. For young couples, the birth of a child is such a time. The birth of a baby is an especially joyous event.

It is a time of intense feelings. Parents are excited, exhausted, and full of anticipation. There is celebration, wonder, gift-giving, baby naming, reorientation, and realization. Friends and family reach out. Connections are made with other new parents, and parents naturally begin to seek support

and guidance on how to raise their children.

In recognition of the vital role that programming for Jewish parents might play, we have started planning to open the first Infant program at MLRT!

#### **Needs of New Parents**

Having a baby and becoming a family creates a need for parents to connect with others in a similar life stage. There is also a need to communicate with more experienced parents and professionals who can guide new parents through development, milestones, and any bumps in the road.

Our new infant program will allow parents of very young children to meet one another. It also fits into the synagogue's goal to continue bridging multigenerational programming.

The new infant program will give parents various chances to meet, connect, share experiences, form playgroups and carpools, or even find a good pediatrician. The parental friendships formed when children are young are often very long-lasting friendships. As a whole community, we are aware of this and design this educational program with plenty of opportunities for socializing.

We strongly believe that the formation of deep and strong relationships between young parents and their children can last for a lifetime, extending from children's earliest years to when they start Religious School, Tribe, and college.

#### Infants and Young Toddlers Program at MLRT ECE

This new Infant and Young Toddlers program will provide care for infants and toddlers ranging in age from 12 weeks to two years, including a Jewish educational component. This program integrates an early childhood developmental curriculum with a Jewish curriculum for most working parents. Children are in the program from 8:00 am to 5:30 pm.

#### Our Program Thrives Because of Our Jewish Communal Professionals Who Are Passionate About Their Work

The current stage of planning involves additional training for our current ECE teachers who are already highly skilled in working with young children. Our goal is to increase their early childhood expertise, expand their ability to reach new parents, and showcase their unique skills and enthusiasm.

#### **Foster Personal Relationships**

Personal relationships are the building blocks for everything we do at MLRT ECE. We regularly hear from parents who come to our program to meet other parents and build new Jewish content for themselves and their children. Relationships are at the heart of our community, and parents become part of our community because they develop strong relationships with each other, with our educators, and with our clergy & staff. Jewish engagement, relationships, and friendships can influence future choices, teach about Jewish rituals, and give Judaism a positive face.

Different cultures, religions, and ethnic groups mark the changing of years in different ways. In the modern era, people around the world are united in marking the changing on the secular year according to January 1 of the Gregorian calendar. We celebrate with countdowns, fireworks, and parties. For the Jewish community, the year changes on the first day of the Hebrew month of Tishrei, or Rosh Hashanah. This, however, isn't technically the first day of the first month of the year. That honor goes to the first day of Nisan, when we Jews first left Egypt. This is called Tu B'Shevat and it has become a very important day to celebrate the earth and renew our commitment to protect it. This year we will be having a special Tu B'Shevat Seder and Shabbat Service on January 26.

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
