In 2005 Queen Elizabeth knighted the Chief Rabbi of England, Rabbi Jonathan Sacks. In telling the story he shares that Buckingham Palace is particularly sensitive to diplomatic issues. When the Queen or another royal personage comes to lay the sword on your shoulder in the ceremony, one must kneel.

Drawing from the Purim story, Rabbi Sacks, like Mordechai, would not kneel for anyone except the Holy Ones and he explained the situation to the powers that be. This presented a serious diplomatic issue in the Palace as to what to do. They devised an apparatus that allowed Rabbi Sacks to incline 10 or 15 degrees towards Her Majesty without actually kneeling, thereby satisfying

the concern regarding diplomacy. When the big day arrived, he followed the proper protocol, inclining toward the Queen, and she rested her sword on his shoulder, but she did say, in an undertone to Prince Phillip, "Tell me, why is this knight different?"

It's nice to know Queen Elizabeth had an excellent sense of humor, and I would venture to guess that Queen Esther did as well in order to navigate the complexities of her royal and familial life.

As we prepare to celebrate Purim later this month and Pesach next month, these festivals serve as a worthwhile reminder of the value of freedoms we cherish as a people. In the Purim story, we find Esther and Mordechai working together to find a way to free their community from Haman's nefarious plans to eliminate the Jews from Shushan; during Pesach, we recount the narrative of Moses and Aaron negotiating with Pharaoh to release the Israelites to worship the Holy One, and with a little help from God, the 10 plagues help them accomplish this goal. With each holiday, we celebrate the Jewish people's hard-won freedom from those who would oppress or demonize us.

These stories are part of our heritage and guide us to reflect on the freedom we have to gather and observe the holidays as a community, to speak out about the injustices of the world, to fight for equality for all, to worship as we wish, and most precious of all, the freedom to live freely as Jews. This is a gift.

While the past several months have been incredibly difficult as a Jewish community, we are blessed to have the opportunity to come together to celebrate Purim, retelling the story of the heroic Esther and Mordechai on March 23 with a particularly fun Karaoke Night. In April, we will continue the tradition of our people by retelling the story of the exodus from Egypt at Festival Services on the mornings of April 23 and 29, and by offering a Second Night Seder on April 23.

The author Dara Horn wrote, "Since ancient times, in every place they have ever lived, Jews have represented the frightening prospect of freedom. As long as Jews existed in any society, there was evidence that it in fact wasn't necessary to believe what everyone else believed, that those who disagreed with their neighbors could survive and even flourish against all odds. The existence of Jews in any society is a reminder that freedom is possible, but only with responsibility—and that freedom without responsibility is no freedom at all."

The Calling of a Cantor

Next year marks 50 years of women in the Cantorate. It all started with a girl and a dream. Cantor Barbara Ostfeld was determined to do something that hadn't been done before. She wasn't trying to break the glass ceiling; she felt a calling and simply wanted a chance to be what she wanted to be. In a ground-breaking shift from the norm, Cantor Ostfeld applied to and attended the School of Sacred Music at Hebrew Union College and was ordained in 1975. Though she was no stranger to the challenges of being the first female Cantor, because of her hard work and determination, Cantor Ostfeld became one of the most renowned Cantors of her generation and a true mentor and inspiration to decades of Cantors. I am honored to call Cantor Ostfeld my colleague and friend.

Because of my role on the Executive Board of the American Conference of Cantors, I have been invited to be a part of a task force for the ACC planning for the year ahead to celebrate the incredible milestone of 50 years of women in the Cantorate. UCLA's School of Ethnomusicology offers a music series known as Stories of Music, and I am excited to get to work on an installment of the series, celebrating our 50th anniversary milestone. Specifically, I am working with Dr. Mark Kligman, my former professor at HUC-JIR, now the Department Chair of Ethnomusicology at UCLA, and another colleague from the Boston area, examining the trends of the Cantorate, the evolution of the female voice in the Cantorate, female influences of the Cantorate and within the Cantorate, and so much more. The segment we are beginning to work on in honor of 50 years of women in the Cantorate will not be ready nor debuted until next winter, but the work behind the scenes is very exciting.

Throughout the year, I will be diving deep into the history of the Cantorate and the history of the female voice and influence in the Cantorate. This will include Jewish and non-Jewish influences, the hurdles, the successes, cultural influences, and everything in between. Stay tuned; this will be the first of several bulletin articles dedicated to the celebration of 50 years of women in the Cantorate.

Israel Matters

The Druze population numbers about one million worldwide and 145,000 in Israel. As loyal Israeli citizens, they serve in the military. The Druze community is separate from Islam and has experienced persecution by different Muslim regimes but is known to be loyal to their countries of residence. And lately, they are making their mark in the world of haute cuisine.

One of five sisters, Naifa Mulla learned to cook from her grandmother. After a year of national service, she attended college, married a fellow IDF soldier named Khaled, had a child, and moved to Ramat Gan to work in a bank. While having dinner at a trendy Tel Aviv restaurant, she asked to train with the chef and discovered that cooking was her true passion. After four and a half years of learning at that same restaurant and several years of catering, she decided to open her own restaurant, which she named Naifa. Her delicious Druze cuisine with ingredients from the village where she grew up, brought in fresh weekly, results in sold-out sittings – a testament to this 34-year-old chef!

Another notable Druze woman, Baama Hino, has turned her restaurant, Noor, into a kosher venue so that she could feed IDF soldiers stationed near her village of Julis in the Galilee. Lamb and yogurt are typical ingredients of Druze cooking, but in order to obtain kosher certification, Baama adapted her recipes and uses a vegan yogurt. Despite current conditions, both her restaurant and her deliveries to the military are thriving.

As is the Druze town of Daliat el-Carmel, a mixture of modernity and tradition. Starting as a small settlement, the town now has 18,000 residents. A mecca for tourists, it offers a popular outdoor market, art galleries, and great restaurants. Year-round festivals including performances, music, and art exhibits are being planned. A true Druze success story.

Spring Cleaning for Your Mind, Body, and Soul

Did you know that spring cleaning is an example of what psychologists refer to as "temporal landmarks"? A well-organized closet tells your brain that you are entering into a new phase of the year.

In addition to the aesthetic and functional benefits of decluttering and deep cleaning your home or office, spring cleaning offers some exciting benefits for your mind, body and soul.

- 1.Reduce stress in minutes: According to the British Journal of Sports Medicine, just 20 minutes of cleaning can reduce stress and anxiety levels by as much as 20%.
- 2. Make healthier food choices: A study published in Psychology Science showed that people who worked in an organized area were twice as likely to opt for an apple over a chocolate bar than those who worked at a messy desk.
- 3. Breathe easier: The American Lung Association reports that dusting regularly helps you breathe better by preventing respiratory issues and supporting a healthy immune system. Pesach

What is Pesach (Passover)?

Pesach is a Festival of Freedom, when we recall how God released our ancestors from slavery in Egypt and assisted in bringing a free people into existence. Pesach is an Agricultural Festival, which in ancient times marked the beginning of the grain harvest. In those days, our ancestors were farmers tilling the soil for a livelihood. The story of Passover reminds us of the Land of Israel. Pesach is a Pilgrimage Festival. Three times during the year, the Israelites, according to the laws of the Torah, went in joyous procession to Jerusalem. There they celebrated the three festivals that occur during the year: Pesach, Shavuot, and Sukkot.

Pesach is all of these things, but it is especially a holiday for children-a tradition to pass on from generation to generation - L'dor V'dor... Our ancestors were instructed: "You shall tell it to your (son) child." Today, Jews around the world still follow the tradition of retelling the story of Pesach. We recount the story of the Jews in the land of Egypt and the trials and tribulations that our ancestors endured. We teach our children to value freedom, never taking it for granted and fighting for those who are still not free.

As the sun sets on Monday, April 22, Jews throughout the world will begin the celebration of Pesach. They will gather at the Seder table and retell the story of Passover, the Jewish struggle for freedom from oppression.

Traditionally, Judaism views the Seder as both a meal and as teaching opportunity. While the Haggadah teaches us the story of Pesach, we each have stories to share with each other. And, it is the most memorable of holidays for our children as we gather round the beautiful holiday table to retell the story of Exodus, enjoy these special foods, search for the afikomen, welcome Elijah and join together in the singing of ancient melodies.

2ND NIGHT PESACH SEDER - TUESDAY, APRIL 23 at 5:30 pm

Back by popular demand the Seder will be catered by Catering by Design. All the trimmings are included: charoset, maror, grape juice, matzah, seder plates, oh my! It is BYO wine and dessert (the latter is shared with the community). The following symbolic foods should be placed near the leader of the Seder. During the course of the Seder, they are pointed out and explained. On the Seder plate (use either a special one for this purpose or a regular dinner plate), include:

- Shank bone-z'roah, symbolizes the lamb that was sacrificed in ancient days.
- · Roasted egg-beitzah, represents the Pesach sacrificial offering of ancient days as well as the wholeness and continuing cycle of life
- Bitter herbs-maror (horseradish or romaine lettuce), reminds us of the bitter lives of the Hebrew slaves
- Charoset (the mixture of apples, nuts, sweet wine, cinnamon and sugar in the Ashkenazic fashion or dates, nuts and sweet wine in the Sephardic tradition), reminds us of the bricks and mortar made by the Hebrew slaves
- Greens-karpas, symbolizes the springtime of the year when Pesach takes place

Elijah's Cup – A special cup filled with wine. According to legend, Elijah visits every Seder in every home on Pesach and drinks from his cup.

Miriam's Cup – A cup filled with water to honor the role of Miriam the Prophetess in the Exodus and to highlight the contributions of women to Jewish culture, past and present.

Haggadah – The book containing the order of the Seder.

Candles – Pesach is one of the three Pilgrimage Festivals when candles are lit and blessed just as they are on Shabbat.

Matzah – The unleavened bread of affliction that our ancestors ate as they left Egypt.

Salt Water - Symbolic of the tears our ancestors shed in Egypt.

Every year at Passover, we affirm our obligation to care for one another by proclaiming "Let all who are hungry come and eat." Two ways to help, both locally and globally, are below.

Our communal ECE MLRT Seder Journey! Celebrating Passover with a Seder is a time-honored tradition. However, at ECE MLRT, we just hosted the second time a new custom that is currently enjoying a revival among Jewish communities - the creation and celebration of a Tu B'Shevat Seder. This ritual was developed in the 16th century by the Kabbalists (Jewish Mystics) in Safed in Northern Israel. Unlike the Pesach Haggadah, the liturgy for Tu B'Shevat is less developed and codified; hence, there is more significant space for the creative organization of this festive celebration.

As with the Pesach Seder, it is highlighted by drinking four cups of wine, with a difference: each cup represents a different season. The first cup is traditionally white wine representing winter, the second white with a few drops of red for spring, the third a mix of red and white for summer, and the fourth primarily red for fall.

ECE MLRT hosted its second Tu B'Shevat Seder this year for and with all young children, focusing less on the different colors of the grape juice that would mark each season and more on highlighting the importance of and the meaning of eating four groups of fruits at various points during the Seder. The older children in our school spent days discussing the Seven Species – Shivat HaMinim- as the seven agricultural products – two grains and five fruits – listed in the Torah as unique products of the land of Israel. While the wheat crackers and the grapes were not a novelty for almost all children, tasting the figs, dates, and pomegranates was a new experience for many of our young friends.

In a kid-friendly expose, we introduced those fruits as each group of fruits related to a different realm or rung of existence — physical, emotional, intellectual, and spiritual. You may think that this was too intense and even less realistic to do with our audience. However, we could argue with you and highlight that our young friends' participation level transformed Seder from ordinary to memorable.

As we approach our first-ever whole school Passover Seder, we hang on to meaningful ways to replicate some of the memorable Tu B'Shevat Seder moments in this upcoming school-wide Seder celebration. Sure, the purpose of a Seder might be "to celebrate Passover." Still, we wondered if we could go a bit deeper and find something even more specific that will impact the growth of our young audience in their spiritual and educational journey. For example, maybe the Passover Seder will re-enact an important Jewish story by connecting it to themes of struggle that remain relevant today or express our love for friends and family by preparing distinctive foods with powerful symbolism. Our upcoming school-wide Passover Seder will be another meaningful gathering in which we want to remain truthful to our children and families.

In whichever format you and your family choose to participate through or plan for the Passover Seder, remember that the key to that whole experience is to express thanks and gratitude and create opportunities to reflect and make meaning of the Seder. Chag Sameach!



Thinking about the holiday, I began focusing on the fact that Purim has a woman at the center of the story; it is the Book of Esther. I became interested in whether secular women knew this female oriented tale. For example, was Esther esteemed by non-jews for her heroism in saving the Jewish population? My research revealed some remarkable history. Surprisingly, Vashti was extolled as much or more than Esther. Esther's bravery was appreciated as that of a cunning, passive nature, while Vashti's was outright assertive.

The American author and abolitionist, Hariet Beecher Stowe considered Vashti's refusal to dance before King Ahasuerus' court as a "first stand for women's rights." Elizabeth Cady Stanton, writer, and early leader of the women's suffrage movement in the 1800s, called Vashti a "sublime representative of self-

centered womanhood" who rises "to the heights of self-consciousness and of self-respect."

I have always loved Purim – dressing up as a character as a child, eating my mother's delicious hamantaschen, making noise at the mention of Haman's name during the reading of the megillah, and so on. My recent learning of the interpretation and admiration of the women at the center of the story provides another level of appreciation for the holiday at a time when I believe it is important for women to stand up for our rights.

In this vein, I am proud that MLRT Sisterhood enhances Purim each year by providing Shalach Manot. I have always considered this activity as a lovely way to enable the congregation to stay connected. I now also look at it as Sisterhood enhancing a holiday celebrating women.




