One of the most beloved rabbinic texts is Pirkei Avot. The very first entry claims "Moses received the Torah at Sinai and transmitted it to Joshua, Joshua transmitted it to the elders, and the elders to the prophets, and the prophets to the Men of the Great Assembly." These words reflect the Jewish idea that we are part of a great chain of tradition, a *shalshelet hakabbalah*, a chain that dates back from Sinai until today.

And that every generation is entrusted with a link in this sacred chain.

The original creative team of "Fiddler on the Roof" comprised numerous outsiders to America's predominant ethnicity, cultural identity and morality. Beginning with author Shalom Aleichem and his nonstarter bid for acceptance in American Yiddishe theater, to director/ choreographer Jerome Robbins and his coercion by the House on Un-American Activities Committee, the roof of "Fiddler" was crowded with iconoclasts and provocateurs.

2024 marks the 60th anniversary of the famed musical. Somewhere in world, whether in a country high school or a big city theater, Fiddler is being performed. Somewhere right now Tevye is contending once more with his unruly daughters. With large dollops of behind-the scenes insight, entertainment and video examples, Karl Middleman provides a fresh look at the delights and upheavals of America's most beloved musical.

Karl Middleman is a conductor and educator who has lectured over fifty times for the Philadelphia Orchestra. He has received awards from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Pew Center for Arts and Heritage.

In addition, Raymond has been a religious school teacher and B'nai Mitzvah tutor for a number of years passing on the traditions of the Jewish people to the next generation.

Outside of synagogue life, Raymond is an award-winning Musical theatre actor and has performed in numerous symphonic and theatrical productions. With their drag persona Miss Livinya Karr, Raymond wrote a series of programming called "Rainbow Shabbat" which has been implemented in synagogues all across the country and internationally.

This shabbatone encourages LGBTQIA+ shul goers to not only feel comfortable as a "Jew-in-the-pew", but serves as an outreach program to say that their community encourages them to take leadership positions on their boards, committees, and even as their clergy. Ready. Set. Renew!

Membership renewal season at MLRT begins in May with special early bird enrollment opportunities for our Religious School families.

On May 14, 1948, soon-to-be Prime Minister David Ben Gurion declared the independence of the State of Israel, which was recognized by the United States, the Soviet Union, and other countries, though not by the surrounding Arab states. Yom Ha'Atzmaut (Israeli Independence Day) marks the anniversary of the establishment of the modern state of Israel. It is observed on or near the 5th of the Hebrew month of Iyar on the Jewish calendar.

Spring Holidays

Yom Ha'Atzmaut in Israel is always preceded by Yom HaZikaron-Memorial Day for the Fallen Soldiers. The message of linking these two days is clear: Israelis owe their independence-the very existence of the stateto the soldiers who sacrificed their lives for it.

Celebrate Israel's Independence Day with MLRT on Tuesday, May 14! There will be a special short story, short film, and other activities to celebrate Yom Ha'Atzmaut.

Rabbi Jeffrey Salkin will speak during our Shabbat Services on May 17 about Israel and his new book, <u>Tikkun Ha'Am: Judaism and the Crisis of Liberal Judaism</u>.

Rabbi Salkin has a national and international reputation as one of America's most guoted rabbis and thought leaders. His words have been cited in The New York Times, The New Republic, and USA Today. He has appeared on many television and radio programs, and has spoken in more than a hundred communities, including in Israel, Great Britain, Cuba, and Poland. His colleagues describe him as "intellectually fearless;" "an activist for Jewish ideas;" and "a public intellectual of the pulpit." Don't miss this special sermon!

Since the establishment of the State of Israel in 1948, four new holidays have been added to the Jewish calendar – Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day), Yom HaZikaron (Memorial Day), Yom Ha'Atzmaut (Independence Day), and Yom Y'rushalayim (Jerusalem Day, which celebrates the reunification of the city in 1967).

The Israeli Knesset (parliament) established the day that precedes Yom Ha'Atzmaut as Yom HaZikaron, a day to memorialize soldiers who lost their lives fighting in the War of Independence and subsequent battles, as well as a day to remember civilian victims of terrorism.¹

Shavuot celebrates the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai and encourages us to embrace the Torah's teachings and be inspired by the wisdom that Jewish tradition has to offer. Shavuot is Hebrew for "weeks," and the holiday occurs seven weeks after Passover.

Unlike Passover, with Seder, or Sukkot, with the building of the Sukkah or waving of the lulav and etrog, there are few rituals, either synagogue-based or home-centered associated with Shavuot. In ancient times, Shavuot was a pilgrimage festival during which Israelites brought crop offerings to the Temple in Jerusalem. Today, it is a celebration of Torah, education, and the choice to participate actively in Jewish life.

Our Shavuot Festival Service and Yizkor will take place on Wednesday, June 12 at 10:30 am.

TISHA B'AV - Monday, August 12 at 7:30 pm at MLRT

Tisha B'Av, observed on the 9th of the Hebrew month of Av, is a day of mourning the destruction of both ancient Temples in Jerusalem. In modern times, many Jews understand Tisha B'Av as a day to remember many tragedies that have befallen the Jewish people throughout history, and to reflect on the suffering that still occurs in our world. We feel this acutely in the post-October 7 world, as our hearts and minds struggle with the violence afflicting our beloved Israel.

Even as we mourn, there is an element of joy and comfort. Indeed, the reading of Eicha, Lamentations, concludes with the verse "Restore us to You, O Lord, that we may be restored! Renew our days as of old." Please join us for this sacred day in the Jewish calendar with traditional liturgy and study, noting that this is customarily a fast day.

Teach Our Children: Early Childhood Education

MLRT School for Early Childhood Education Whole Child Development Approach Beyond teaching academics, schools can foster children's relationships, identity, emotional skills, and overall well-being. Children are multidimensional "whole" beings whose development is complex and rich. Learning involves far more than merely acquiring knowledge in different subjects. Children need to grow and learn in their relationships, identity, emotional understanding, and overall well-being.

The brain's capacity develops most fully when children feel emotionally and physically safe, connected, engaged, and challenged. Learning is social, emotional, and academic. Positive relationships, including trust in the teacher, and positive emotions, such as interest and excitement, open the mind to learning. Children can build skills and awareness to work with emotions in themselves and their relationships. Positive, stable relationships—when adults have the understanding, empathy, and cultural competence to understand and listen to children, they can support young people in

understanding their roles within the school community.

At MLRT School for Early Childhood Education, we foster a supportive environment that promotes strong relationships among staff, students, and families. Creating a positive school climate based on solid relationships provides a bedrock for learning. As a result, our students feel a sense of safety and belonging to thrive in school. We promote a sense of community that allows teachers to know their students well by having small class sizes; our teachers consistently check in with students and parents; the whole staff practices cultural competence, inviting children's experiences into the classroom and communicating that all children are valued.

Teachers implement meaningful, engaging instructional practices that develop children's ability to manage their learning. Young children crave opportunities to learn things that matter and are relevant to their lives. For example, our teachers connect lessons in mathematics to everyday tasks students are engaged in that use those skills, such as in small cooking activities, artwork, outdoor or indoor gross motor activities, etc. In addition, we teach young children self-worth and selfcontrol, skills that critically outperform any other positive measures of children's long-term outcomes. So, by talking with children about the best approach to a particular task and having them describe the strategy, they intend to test, for example, or ask each child to consider what could go wrong and how they might improve the task if completing it again as at the core of our approach to investigate and explore new topics. Using relevant, playful, and experimental activities in the classroom, our teachers encourage the learners to plan, monitor, and evaluate their processes and use tools like mind mapping and narrative structures to advance their learning.

We view the school as an interconnected system encompassing extended learning opportunities and community partnerships. These partnerships are not just collaborations but exciting avenues for excellent enrichment programs. For instance, we have teamed up with Yoga@Play (for Yoga), Weeplaylanguage (for Hebrew), and Chef Dad (for cooking) to offer immersion experiences where children learn from professionals to acquire a new language and regulate emotions through physical or fun and challenging activities. Moreover, through partnerships with families and providers or social services that can help children overcome barriers to learning, we provide support that reflects a whole-school approach to whole-child development, maximizing opportunities for all children to succeed.

Together, these elements form an integral part of a comprehensive framework that, in practice, builds on and reinforces each other. Extensive research shows that successful education cannot be achieved in a fragmented manner. Instead, an integrated approach can help children develop to their full potential, embracing their complexity and humanity. We at MLRT School for Early Childhood Education strive to uphold these principles, ensuring that every child here feels loved, cared for, recognized, and actively participates in our school community's wellbeing.

Authoring these articles for our Temple's Bulletins has turned me into an avid "Googler." Accordingly,

<u>Sisterhood President</u> I researched the history of Mother's Day to see if there is any Jewish basis for celebrating the day. Mother's Day was first celebrated in 1908 by peace activist Anna Jarvis to honor her deceased mother by continuing the activist work she started. In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson enacted the holiday to be celebrated the second Sunday of May. Ironically, Anna Jarvis came to oppose the morphing of the holiday into one commercialized with gifts, candy, and pre-made cards. She even protested a candy maker's convention in 1923 and a meeting of American War Mothers, who sold Mother's Day carnations, in 1925 where she was arrested.

Regarding Judaism's view of Mother's Day, there is no specific day to honor one's mother. The commandment "Honor your father and your mother" is not limited to one day a year. Furthermore, Jewish matriarchs: Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel, and Leah are referenced throughout the year. One could make the case that in Judaism, every day is Mother's Day.

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
