Celebrate THE Festival

To say that the Jewish calendar "frontloads" the holidays is perhaps an understatement. As you all know, Rosh Hashanah begins the New Year, followed ten days later by Yom Kippur. In reality, our preparations for the High Holy Days begin before Rosh Hashanah, with our Selichot prayers and meditations. Our tradition actually encourages us to begin our preparations and focus for the High Holy Days during the entire month of Elul (the month that proceeds Rosh Hashanah), with the inclusion of special prayers and psalms that focus our attention on the themes of these days: *heshbon hanefesh*, making a spiritual account of the direction of our lives, and *teshuva*, the process of renewal, transformation and change.

Days to the intimacy of the Sukkah. In some ways, Sukkot is the most sensuous of our festivals; we smell the sweet fragrance of the *etrog* and wave the *lulav* in all directions, hoping to become more aware of the earth's bounty, and the myriad blessings of life that surround us. The rabbis called Sukkot *hehag*, The Festival, for Sukkot was in many ways THE festival par excellence for them. And our Fall Festivals conclude with one of the newer holidays of the Jewish calendar, Simchat Torah, when we finish reading the Torah and begin all over again. It is a "newer holiday" because originally most Jews followed a triennial cycle of Torah reading, meaning it took 3 years to complete the reading of the Torah, not an annual cycle as we mostly practice today.

I'm not sure if I were in charge of designing the calendar today, I'd have so many celebrations so close together. Maybe that's why Sukkot and Simchat Torah often seem to get lost. Over the last few years, we've tried to re-invigorate our celebrations of these really fun holidays. We've spent a fair amount of time focusing on how we can reduce the barriers to participation, real or imagined.

Here are two ways we want to encourage you to join us in celebrating Sukkot this year:

- 1. Build a home sukkah. It really is easy, and we've made it even easier. Thanks to the generosity of our Brotherhood, we have a limited number of home Sukkah kits available to you. The kit is the size of a small duffle bag. It will take you less than 15 minutes to assemble. We ask only three things: you actually put up the sukkah, you invite some friends or Temple members to join you for a snack in your sukkah, and you return the kit with all the parts to us when you are done.
- 2. We'll bring the Sukkah to you! Invite us to your home or your apartment and we'll bring the MLRT Sukkah-Mobile to you. (We are thinking on a flat bed trailor towed by one of our cars!) Again, all we ask is that you invite us to your home, and you invite a few friends to join us all under the sukkah. Let us know when we should come.

The rabbis were right. Sukkot can be the festival, par excellence. Make this year the year you do something to celebrate Sukkot with us.

We Are Listening!



There is a distinction between hearing and listening. Hearing is simply the act of perceiving sound by the ear. If you are not hearing-impaired, hearing simply happens. It is passive behavior, just a by-product of having ears and all their working parts. Listening, however, is active; it requires conscious choice. Listening is how we attach meaning to sounds, leading us to learning. Listening is also how we show others that we care. It shows kindness and respect to listen to others and not just hear them.

Many of us have been blessed with the ability to hear, but few of us have taken time to refine the art of listening. We are "hard of listening" rather than "hard of hearing." Often, as soon as someone else begins to speak, we begin preparing a response. We are not listening to understand, just to reply. Hardly ten words escape their mouths and our rebuttal is on our minds, if not already

on our lips. Sometimes we are preoccupied with other ideas or worries and are unable to set them aside to pay full attention with our ears and our minds. Other times we hold preconceived notions about the speaker or the subject and tune out, hearing the words without listening to the message. And sometimes, we are simply self-centered, focused only on what we want to say, rather than what there is to be heard. We hear what we want to hear, instead of what is intended.

There is an old saying that God created us with one mouth and two ears so that we might spend twice as much time listening as talking. Perhaps the two ears are there to hear and to listen, to gather sounds and glean meaning. It takes practice to learn to listen and not just to hear; it takes effort to pay attention, understand, and take what we hear to heart.

Listening lies at the very heart of relationships. It means that we are open to the other person, that we respect him or her, and that their perceptions and feelings matter to us. Often the greatest gift we can give someone is to listen to them. It can often be difficult to truly listen what others are saying to us, especially when we are presented with new ideas or criticism. Truly listening takes not only an open ear, but an open mind and an open heart as well. This needs to be an intentional shift in the way we approach the conversation. We stand to benefit much more deeply if we open ourselves up to truly listen.

Main Line Reform Temple Beth Elohim is a community of about 1,000 families. We provide spiritual, intellectual, and cultural enrichment for and social action to our congregational family and the surrounding community. Our objective is to foster a vibrant, inclusive community in which members feel strongly connected to MLRT and to each other.

To further this objective, this past January, I announced a project to meet with every member of the congregation to listen to your thoughts and ideas. Over the past eight months, a committee initially led by Vice President Dave Heppen and now led by Board of Trustees member Elliott Schulman has been working on this project. In July and August, the committee hosted three pilot sessions with congregants to listen to their thoughts and concerns. The pilot sessions were extremely successful and we are now ready to launch this project to the rest of our congregation. We invite all of you to participate in our Listening Campaign so that you can be heard.

The Listening Campaign will bring small groups of congregants together to identify common passions, concerns, and needs. We want to listen to you to understand your shared interests. We want to discuss how MLRT can help you manage life's challenges. We also want you to tell us what is MLRT doing well and what are we can improve. What could we do differently?

By using small groups, led by a congregant facilitator, we will have the opportunity to listen to our congregation's diverse voices. These groups will be hosted by a congregant and will meet either at a congregant's house or at MLRT. All settings are intended to be relaxed and informal. 



Brotherhood

We have been inscribed in the Book of Life. For the year ahead we will be able to act on our Jewish values which have been our lodestone for centuries. Allow me a digression so that I can tell you about the Men of Reform Judaism convention in Memphis, Tennessee this past June.

While Memphis may boast fine BBQ fare, for we attendees the chief attraction was the National Civil Rights Museum. The museum is directly adjacent to the Lorraine Motel, the site of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King on April 4, 1968. Its exhibits trace the history of the Civil Rights Movement in the United States from the 17th century to the present. Rabbi Micah Greenstein, senior Rabbi of Temple Israel, the largest Reform Congregation in the state and whose congregation hosted us to services and dinner later in the day, is a docent of the museum.

What did we learn that day, and what was reinforced from what we had known? At the height of the Civil Rights Movement Dr. King was engaged in an internecine struggle with his own clergy and the clergy of other faiths. As Albert Einstein had already observed, "The world is a dangerous place, not because of those who do evil, but because of those who look on and do nothing." Dr. King addressed his "Letter From the Birmingham Jail" not to bigots but to ministers and rabbis who spoke about equality but whom he viewed as well-intentioned fence-sitters. Most striking in all his writings is this: Martin Luther King speaks of the "fierce urgency of now." If there ever was a call to action, this was it. And it is echoed in the eulogy on April 5 by Rabbi James A. Wax, a King confidant. He, too, laments the inaction of some of our "so-called civic leaders." Rabbi Wax included the clergy of every stripe.



Sukkot & Simchat Torah

סוכות |Sukkot

Sukkot, a Hebrew word meaning "booths" or "huts," refers to the annual Jewish festival of giving thanks for a bountiful fall harvest and commemorates the 40 years of Jewish wandering in the desert after the giving of the Torah at Mt. Sinai. Sukkot is marked by several distinct traditions, including erecting and dwelling in a sukkah (a temporary booth or hut). Sukkot (pl.) are commonly used during the seven-day festival for eating, entertaining and even for sleeping.

Sukkot, also called Z'man Simchateinu (Season of Our Rejoicing), is the only festival with an explicit commandment to rejoice. A final name for Sukkot is Chag HaAsif, (Festival of the Ingathering), a time to give thanks for the bounty of the earth during the fall harvest. The eighth day of Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret, is traditionally a separate festival in its own right. In Reform congregations, which generally observe one day of holidays rather than two, Shemini Atzeret is observed concurrently with Simchat Torah, the festival of "rejoicing in the Torah."




